**PETRINO ERA BEGINS:** Arkansas head coach Bobby Petrino will make his Razorback head coaching debut as the Hogs open with the Western Illinois Leathernecks at Donald W. Reynolds Razorback Stadium in Fayetteville at 6 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 30.

Petrino was named the 30th Arkansas head coach in school history on Dec. 11, 2007, after spending one season as the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons. Prior to moving to the National Football League, Petrino distinguished himself as one of the best coaches in college football during his four-year tenure at the University of Louisville. Petrino posted a 41-9 (.820) record with the Cardinals.

In his 24th year as a coach, including his 20th on the collegiate level and four in the NFL, he was 3-10 with the Falcons after going 41-9 at Louisville. His teams at Louisville went 9-4 in 2003 and played in the GMAC Bowl, falling to No. 14 Miami (Ohio); 11-1 in 2004 with a Conference USA title, a win over No. 10 Boise State in the Liberty Bowl, 44-40, and a No. 7 final ranking; 9-3 in 2005 with a spot in the Gator Bowl, where the Cardinals fell to No. 12 Virginia Tech, and a No. 19 final ranking; and 12-1 in 2006 with a Big East Conference championship, a win over No. 12 Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl, 24-13, and a No. 6 final ranking.

The 2006 Cardinals ranked second in the nation in total yards (475.3 yards per game) and fourth in the nation in scoring offense (37.8 points per game). His 2004 squad led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), and set an NCAA record by scoring 50 or more points in five-straight games.

In addition to Louisville, Petrino's college experience includes stops at Arizona State, Nevada, Utah State and Auburn. In addition to coaching the Falcons, his NFL experience includes two years working as the quarterbacks coach and one as the offensive coordinator with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Among active NCAA Bowl Subdivision head coaches with at least four years experience, Petrino ranks second in the nation in career winning percentage (.820) trailing only USC's Pete Carroll (.844). For a complete list of the top 10 please refer to Petrino's bio in these notes.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Arkansas and Western Illinois will meet on the gridiron for the first time this season.

**HOGS AGAINST THE GATEWAY CONFERENCE:** While Arkansas and Western Illinois will meet for the first time in football, the Razorbacks are no stranger to at least one member of the Gateway Conference. The Razorbacks are 5-0 against Missouri State on the gridiron including a 49-17 win in the most recent meeting in the 2005 season opener.

Joining Western Illinois in the Gateway Conference are Illinois State, Indiana State, Missouri State, North Dakota State, Northern Iowa, South Dakota State, Southern Illinois and Youngstown State.

**SEASON OPENERS:** Arkansas has won 18 of its last 23 season-opening contests. The Hogs are 88-22-4 (.789) all time in season openers, including nine consecutive season-opening victories from 1997-2005. Arkansas saw its streak snapped against Southern California in 2006, but rebounded to win in last year's season opener against Troy.

**SEASON OPENERS IN FAYETTEVILLE:** Arkansas will open its season in Fayetteville for the 70th time when the Razorbacks host Western Illinois in the first game of 2008. Arkansas is 57-9-3 (.848) in the previous season openers played in Fayetteville.

This weekend's game will mark the seventh-straight on-campus season opener for the Razorbacks. The seven-game streak is the longest such string since Arkansas played 15 consecutive openers in Fayetteville from 1929-43.

**PETRINO IN SEASON OPENERS:** Arkansas head coach Bobby Petrino is a perfect 4-0 as a collegiate head coach in season openers. Petrino won all four season openers in his tenure at the University of Louisville. In fact, Petrino and the Cardinals defeated in-state rival Kentucky in all four season openers.

Louisville recorded a 40-24 win over Kentucky in Lexington in Petrino's first game as a head coach in 2003. The Cardinals followed it up with a 28-0 shutout of the Wildcats in 2004, a 31-24 win at Kentucky in 2005 and a 58-29 victory over Kentucky in 2006.

**HIGH-SCORING DEBUTS:** The arrival of Arkansas head coach Bobby Petrino has Razorback fans anticipating some offensive fireworks resulting in some impressive point totals in the near future. Although Petrino's resume is filled with plenty of evidence to support that thought, the Hogs may have a tough time breaking the record for most points in a season opener anytime soon.

Arkansas recorded the most decisive win in school history against Missouri State in 1911. The school then known as Fourth District Normal fell to the Razorbacks under the direction of Coach Hugo Bezdek in Fayetteville 100-0.

Other potent offensive openers in school history include a 64-0 blanking of Northwestern (La.) State in 1947. More recently, Arkansas has posted a 63-14 win over Pacific in 1988 and a 63-13 win over New Mexico State in 2004.

**LAST TIME FOR ARKANSAS IN A SEASON OPENER:** Anchored by a pair of 100-yard rushing performances from Darren McFadden and Felix Jones and a perfect field-goal kicking night by freshman Alex Tejada, the Arkansas Razorbacks downed the Trojans of Troy University, 46-26, in the 2007 football season opener.

McFadden and Jones combined for 280 yards on the ground and accounted for four touchdowns on the night. McFadden racked up 151 yards and one touchdown on 24 carries in the win. Jones rushed for 129 yards and one touchdown on 12 carries.

The Hogs jumped out to 13-0 lead following a McFadden touchdown, a 12-yard off-tackle rush into the end zone, at the 14:54 mark in the second quarter.

Troy responded with a scoring drive of its own that cut the Arkansas lead, 13-7. Trojan receiver Gary Banks hauled in a 28-yard completion from quarterback Omar Haugabook down to the three-yard line. Two plays later, Troy running back Kenny Cattouse scored on a one-yard run up the middle.

On the ensuing kickoff, junior Felix Jones swung the momentum back into the favor of the Razorbacks with a 90-yard return for a score. Jones finished the night with 144 return yards.

On the next drive, Troy responded with an 11-play drive that covered 83 yards and ended with a Haugabook 17-yard touchdown strike to Gerald Tate that cut the Arkansas lead back to six, 20-14. Tejada padded the Arkansas lead with his third field goal of the half, connecting on a 28 yarder with 44 seconds remaining in the second quarter giving the Hogs a nine-point advantage. The Trojans capitalized with a 42-yard field goal from Greg Whibbs as time expired. The Razorbacks led at the half 23-17.

On its second possession of the second half, Arkansas put the ball in the hands of its backfield and received its usual result. After McFadden gained nine yards on the first play of the drive, Jones took over the load with 54 yards on three rushes. The final run saw the Tulsa, Okla., native take the handoff and motor 44 yards up the right side of the field for his second score of the game.

The Razorbacks stopped Troy on its next drive and following a seven-yard punt by the Trojans' Adrian Vera, Arkansas took possession in Troy territory. On the first play of the drive, Arkansas lined up in the WildHog formation. McFadden took the snap and found freshman Crosby Tuck open for a 42-yard touchdown completion at the 5:32 mark in the third quarter. It was McFadden's fourth—and longest—touchdown pass of his career.

2001 - Arkansas defeats UNLV in Little Rock, 14-10, to open the season.

With a 40-20 advantage, Arkansas tacked on its final touchdown of the night. After a 48-yard rush to the two-yard line, Michael Smith finished off the drive with a short touchdown run to put the Hogs ahead by 26.

**NON-CONFERENCE DOMINANCE:** Arkansas has been impressive in non-conference regular-season games in the last decade. The Razorbacks are 31-3 (.912) in the last 10 years against non-SEC opponents during the regular season.

Arkansas head coach Bobby Petrino is 15-1 as a head coach in non-conference regular season games. Petrino was 4-0 (2003), 2-1 (2004), 4-0 (2005) and 5-0 (2006) against non-conference competition at Louisville. The Cardinals played in Conference USA in 2003-04 and joined the Big East in time for the 2005 season.

The only blemish on Petrino's non-conference record came in a three-point loss at No. 3 Miami (38-41) in 2004. Petrino and the Cardinals returned the favor in 2006 when they topped the No. 7 Hurricanes 31-7 in Louisville.

**RIMINGTON TROPHY WINNER BACK TO ANCHOR THE LINE:** Senior Jonathan Luigs was recognized as the top center in the nation when he received the 2007 Rimington Trophy. A runner-up for the award as a sophomore in 2006, the 2007 winner was also named a first-team All-American by CBSsports.com, the Football Writers Association of America, Rivals, The Sporting News, Phil Steele College Football, CollegeFootballNews.com and Walter Camp. Luigs, a 6-4, 314-pounder from Little Rock, Ark., also earned the Jacobs Trophy, which goes to the top blocker in the South-eastern Conference.

He helped Arkansas lead the SEC and rank fourth in the nation in rushing (286.5), rank 17th in total offense (450.0) and 13th in scoring (37.3). The total offense and scoring averages, and 3,750 rushing yards set school records, along with a 5.96 yards per carry average. In addition to being a Rimington Trophy finalist as a sophomore in 2006, he was an AP third-team All-American and first-team All-SEC. He helped Arkansas lead the SEC and rank fourth in the nation in rushing (228.5), rank 29th in the nation in total offense (378.0) and 31st in scoring (28.9).

As you might expect, Luigs is one of 43 pre-season watch list candidates for the 2008 Rimington Trophy. In the history of the award, there has never been a two-time winner.

**CASEY DICK CLIMBING ARKANSAS' CAREER PASSING CHARTS:** Senior quarterback Casey Dick has made steady progress throughout his career. He started all 13 games in 2007 and has made 18 consecutive starts. As a junior, he was 150-of-262 (.573) for 1,695 yards with 18 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. For his career, he is 268-of-493 for 3,270 yards with 34 touchdowns with 20 interceptions and a .544 completion percentage.

**TEJADA TURNS IN RECORD-SETTING PERFORMANCE IN FIRST YEAR AS HOG KICKER:** Sophomore Alex Tejada had a huge impact as a freshman. Arkansas' place kicker converted 58-of-60 extra point attempts and was 17-of-23 on field goals, and led the team with 109 points scored. His .739 field goal percentage was the ninth-best in school history while the 17 field goals made tie for sixth-best. The 23 attempts also tie for sixth-best.

Tejada's 17 field goals made are the most for a Razorback since Todd Latourette made 17-of-24 in 1998. The last Hog to make more than 17 was Todd Wright, who was 20-of-23 in 1989.

Tejada was 13-of-15 from 39 yards and closer.

His PAT attempts and conversions are school season records, and his 109 points in a season set a school record for a kicker, which also ranks second all-time to Bill Burnett's 120 points in 1969.

**D-LINE COULD BE STRENGTH OF DEFENSE:** While replacing all four starters in the secondary and building depth at linebacker, Arkansas' coaching staff may lean on the defensive line to set the tone on that side of the ball.

Returnees on the line include junior end Adrian Davis, senior nose tackle Ernest Mitchell, junior tackle Malcolm Sheppard, senior end Antwain Robinson, sophomore tackle Patrick Jones, sophomore end Damario Ambrose. All six lettered on defense last year.

Sheppard started 12 games, Mitchell started 11, Davis nine and Robinson six.

**SECONDARY SEEKING FOUR NEW STARTERS:** Michael Grant, Matt Hewitt, Kevin Woods and Matterral Richardson are all gone from last year's starting lineup at left cornerback, strong safety, free safety and right cornerback, respectively, but there is experience to work with.

Junior Jerell Norton, senior Walner Leandre, junior Rashaad Johnson and senior Jamar Love were the backups, respectively.

Norton led the team last year with five interceptions and was second with 11 passes broken up while recording 34 tackles. Leandre had 29 tackles and two PBUs. Johnson had 53 tackles, two interceptions and a forced fumble. Love had 22 tackles, three sacks and four passes broken up.

Other returning lettermen include sophomore cornerback Ramon Broadway, senior cornerback Shedrick Johnson, senior safety Dallas Washington and sophomore cornerback Isaac Madison.

Broadway had 19 tackles in 13 games a year ago, Johnson had seven tackles in 13 games with one start and Washington had 22 tackles in 12 games.

**DAVIS SOLID AT PUNTER:** Senior Jeremy Davis is coming off a good year at punter, averaging 40.0 yards on 60 attempts, marking just the second time in the last seven years Arkansas' leader has averaged 40 or better.

Davis, who has a career long of 55 yards, punted for a total of 2,403 yards, the 12th-best single-season total in school history. Davis, from Fort Smith, Ark., has 85 career punts for 3,382 yards. His career average of 39.8 yards per punt ties for the 10th-best in school history.

**ARKANSAS ATOP THE BOWL LIST:** Arkansas is on top of the bowl appearance list for the SEC Western Division since 1998. Over the last 10 years, Arkansas has earned eight bowl bids. The Razorbacks have made three trips to the Cotton Bowl (2000, 2002, 2008), two to the Citrus/Capital One Bowl (1999, 2007), and one each to the Las Vegas Bowl (2000), Music City Bowl (2002) and the Independence Bowl (2003).

**SCORING STREAK:** Arkansas has scored in a school-record 148 consecutive games. The Razorbacks have not been shut out since a 28-0 loss to LSU in Baton Rouge, La., on Nov. 18, 1995.

Over the last 10 years, Arkansas has scored 20 or more points in 92 of 123 games (.748). The Razorbacks are 44-13 (.772) when scoring 20 or more points over the last seven years.

**RAZORBACK CAPTAINS:** Arkansas coaches and players elected five team captains for the 2008 season. Senior center Jonathan Luigs and senior quarterback Casey Dick were selected as captains from the offensive unit. The Razorbacks' have three team captains from the defensive side of the ball; cornerback Jamar Love, linebacker Elston Forte and defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard.

## Head Coach Bobby Petrino



Long before his first game as head football coach at the University of Arkansas, Bobby Petrino's positive impact on a tradition-rich Arkansas program and a passionate Razorback fan base was abundantly evident. From the boisterous welcome offered from assembled fans at a late-night nationally-televised press conference announcing his hiring to the record attendance numbers at Razorback Clubs in all corners of the state last spring, there is no question that Petrino's arrival in Fayetteville has energized and unified the state behind their beloved Razorback football program.

It is easy to see why Razorback fans are so excited. Petrino is one of the most successful college football coaches in the nation. In his four previous years as a collegiate head coach at the University of Louisville, he won 41 games, led the Cardinals to four-consecutive bowl games, including a victory in the Bowl Championship Series' 2006 FedEx Orange Bowl. His .820 winning percentage ranks second only to USC's Pete Carroll among active NCAA Bowl Subdivision coaches with at least four years experience. His 41 wins rank tied for seventh in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history for most victories by a coach in his first four seasons.

Entering his fifth season as a collegiate head coach and his first at Arkansas, Petrino blends 21 years of collegiate coaching experience with stints in the National Football League as both a head coach and assistant coach to total 25 years of coaching experience.

In addition to Louisville, Petrino's college experience includes stops at Arizona State University, the University of Nevada, Utah State University and Auburn University. His NFL coaching tenures have come with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Atlanta Falcons.

His reputation for engineering high-octane and quick-strike offenses is well deserved. His teams have consistently ranked among the nation's best in total offense and scoring. Although sometimes perceived as a coach that focuses primarily on the passing game, in reality Petrino adheres to the philosophy of balance between offensive production on the ground and through the air. Consider that in the last 10 years of his college coaching career spent as a head coach, an offensive coordinator or both, Petrino's offenses have boasted 70 100-yard rushers and 41 300-yard passers. That equates to 111 defining offensive individual performances in 120 total games.

In his coaching career, Petrino has worked with countless players who went on to play professionally, including an impressive list of NFL quarterbacks. As a head coach, he helped develop quarterbacks Stefan LeFors (2003-04) and Brian Brohm (2004-06) at Louisville. As a coordinator or assistant, he tutored Jason Campbell at Auburn (2002), Chris Redman at Louisville (1998), Jake Plummer at Arizona State (1993), and Doug Nussmeier (1990-91) and John Friesz (1989) at Idaho.

On Dec. 11, 2007, Petrino was named the 30th head coach in Razorback football history. The announcement marked Petrino's return to college football, the very landscape that put him on the coaching map.

Prior to his most recent tenure as the head coach of the Falcons during the 2007 season, Petrino enjoyed four ultra-successful seasons (2003-06) at Louisville. His teams posted a combined record of 41-9 in his tenure for a winning percentage of .820.

In 2006, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 12-1 record, including a 24-13 win over nationally-ranked Wake Forest in the BCS FedEx Orange Bowl. Louisville vaulted to as high as No. 3 in the polls during the season and finished with a final No. 6 national ranking in the Associated Press poll, the highest ranking in school history. Louisville had three victories over top-15 ranked teams, including wins over No. 15 Miami (31-7), No. 3 West Virginia (44-34) and No. 12 Wake Forest (24-13). The 12 victories also set a new school mark, breaking a record Petrino had held in part previously with 11 wins in 2004. The Cardinals won their first Big East Conference title, ranked second in the nation in total yards (475.3 yards per game) and fourth in the nation in scoring offense (37.8 points per game). Louisville also led the Big East in pass offense average (290.0) and first downs (296). Seven Louisville players earned first-team All-Big East honors, the most of any league school.

In 2005, Petrino led Louisville into the Big East Conference and guided the Cardinals to a 9-3 record and their first New Year's Day Bowl game since 1991. Louisville ranked ninth in the nation in total offense (482.1) and third in the nation in scoring offense (43.4). The Cardinals scored at least 30 points in 11 of 12 games, including eight games of more than 40 points, four games of 50 or more points and three 60-point outings. Seven Cardinals earned All-Big East honors in the school's first year in the league, including Bronko Nagurski and Ted Hendricks Award winner Elvis Dumervil. Dumervil led the nation in sacks (20) and forced fumbles (10) on his way to consensus All-America honors. Running back Michael Bush led the nation in scoring (14.4), scored 24 touchdowns and became the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since 1999.

Petrino's 2004 Louisville team went 11-1, won the Conference USA championship and beat No. 10 Boise State in the Liberty Bowl, 44-40, to end the season ranked No. 7. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), surpassed 40 points nine times, scored 50 points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five-straight games. Petrino tied a then-school record for most wins in a season and had a perfect 8-0 record in league play. The Cardinals outscored their conference opponents 453-156 on their way to the school's third Conference USA crown. In the process, school records fell in points scored (597), points per game (49.8), total offense (6,448), touchdowns (80), rushing yardage (3,005), rushing touchdowns (47) and completion percentage (71.3). Under Petrino's tutelage, quarterback Stefan LeFors led the nation in completion percentage (73.5) and passing efficiency (181.74), narrowly missing NCAA records in both categories. The gaudy offensive production also allowed placekicker Arthur Carmody to set an NCAA single-season record with 77-consecutive extra points. Defensively, Louisville led the league and ranked No. 15 in the nation in total defense. The Cardinals were one of only three teams to rank in the top 15 nationally in both total offense and total defense. Louisville had the best combined ranking of any team when taking into account both sides of the ball. For his efforts, Petrino was named the 2004 Conference USA Coach of the Year.

The groundwork for the record-setting success to come was laid in Petrino's first season as a head coach at Louisville in 2003. Taking over a team that had finished 7-6 the season before, Petrino guided the Cardinals to a 9-4 record and a GMAC Bowl berth. The nine wins were the most by a first-year Louisville coach. It didn't take long for Petrino to set the tone in his first collegiate coaching stint. In his first career game as a head coach, Petrino led Louisville to a 40-24 win over arch rival Kentucky. Louisville led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2) and 15th in scoring offense (34.6) in Petrino's inaugural season. Louisville set six Conference USA records including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals raked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

Prior to Louisville hiring him as its head coach, Petrino served one season as the offensive coordinator at Auburn in 2002. In his one season with the Tigers, Auburn went 9-4, including three wins over top-10 ranked opponents, and won a share of the SEC Western Division title. The Tigers led the Southeastern Conference in pass efficiency and third down conversions, and were third in scoring, rushing and total offense. Petrino's influence on Auburn's offensive fortunes resulted in significant improvement as the Tigers improved to No. 31 nationally in scoring offense (31.3) and No. 38 in total offense (358.8) after finishing No. 86 and No. 73 in the same two categories, respectively, in 2001. Auburn completed its season with a victory over No. 10 Penn State on New Year's Day in the Capital One Bowl.

Before going to Auburn, he spent three seasons in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars. He was the quarterbacks coach in 1999 and 2000, and the offensive coordinator in 2001.

While with the Jaguars, he worked with quarterback Mark Brunell, who threw for 3,640 yards in 2000, which was the second-highest total in team history, and 3,309 yards in his 2001 season as offensive coordinator. In 1999, Jacksonville advanced to the AFC Championship Game.

In his first stint at Louisville, he was the offensive coordinator for the Cardinals in 1998. In that one season, Louisville was the top-ranked NCAA Division I-A team in scoring and total offense while recording the biggest turnaround in the nation. The Cardinals improved from 1-10 in 1997 to 7-5 in '98.

Petrino and quarterback Chris Redman helped the Cardinals set school records for points scored (444), scoring average (40.4), touchdowns (62), passing yards (4,498), passing touchdowns (33) and total yards (6,156). Redmen passed for 300 yards or more eight times on the season while reserve quarterback Mike Watkins also topped the 300-yard passing mark once. Louisville scored 60 or more points three times that season (wins over Cincinnati, 62-19; Western Kentucky, 63-44; and East Carolina, 63-45).

The Helena, Mont., native was the offensive coordinator at Utah State for three years (1995-97) before going to Louisville. While in Logan, Utah, he helped Utah State set school records by averaging 468.5 yards of total offense and 317.5 yards passing during the 1996 season. Prior to his arrival, USU averaged just more than 300 yards per game in total offense. In 1996, the Aggies also racked up a school-record 273 first downs, an average of nearly 25 first downs a game.

In 1994, he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Nevada. The Wolfpack ranked second in the nation in passing (330) and total offense (500) per game, and was third in the nation with 37.6 points a game. During his one-year stint at Nevada, the Wolfpack boasted 10 100-yard rushing performances and six 300-yard passing efforts. Nevada posted a 9-2 record and won a share of the Big West Conference title.

In 1992 and '93, he was the quarterbacks coach at Arizona State where he assisted in the development of future All-American and NFL star Jake Plummer. While with the Sun Devils, Petrino also worked with then-ASU quarterback and current UA quarterbacks coach Garrick McGee.

Prior to his two years at Arizona State he was the quarterbacks coach (1989) and offensive coordinator (1990 & 1991) for three seasons at the University of Idaho. He was the wide receivers coach at Weber State in 1987 and '88.

Petrino literally grew up in the coaching profession. His father, Bob Petrino Sr., coached at Carroll College in Helena, Mont., for 26 seasons, earning 163 victories and 15 conference titles. As a child, Petrino Jr. would race after school to the practice field to observe his father during his legendary career.

Bobby Petrino officially started his coaching career as a graduate assistant for his father at Carroll College in 1983. After a graduate assistant stint as quarterbacks coach at Weber State in 1984, Petrino returned to be the offensive coordinator for his father in 1985-86. Carroll had the top-ranked offense in the NAIA ranks in both of his seasons, thanks in large part to the play of Bobby Petrino's younger brother Paul, who was a four-year starter at quarterback at Carroll College. Paul Petrino now serves as Arkansas' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Before Bobby Petrino coached for his father, he played football for him at Carroll College. Petrino played quarterback and twice earned NAIA All-America honors. He led the Fighting Saints to three straight Frontier Conference championships and was named the league's most valuable player in 1981 and 1982. He also played four years of basketball at Carroll. Petrino earned a bachelor's degree in physical education with a minor in mathematics from Carroll College in 1983.
