## LEADING OFF --

- The Razorbacks are one of just five teams nationally to advance to the NCAA Tournament each of the last 14 years. Arkansas is joined by Cal State Fullerton, Florida State, Miami (Fla.) and Rice as the only programs to accomplish the feat.

- Arkansas continues its postseason quest, advancing to the College World Series for the eighth time in program history, making appearances in 1979, 1985, 1987, 1989, 2004, 2009, 2012 and now 2015.

- The Razorbacks look to top the program-best National Runner-up finish in 1979. Since the title game appearance, Arkansas has never won more than two games during a trip to Omaha.

- Arkansas is slated to face Virginia (39-22) in its opening contest. The Razorbacks also join Miami (49-15) and Florida (49-16) in their half of the College World Series bracket.

- The Razorbacks extended their all-time record in Super Regionals to 9-6, including a 4-1 mark at Baum Stadium.

- Arkansas is 71-59 all-time in the NCAA Tournament, including 17 tournament wins in the last four years.

- The Razorbacks are 7-3 in postseason play: 2-2 in the SEC Tournament, 3-0 in the Stillwater Regional and 2-1 in the Fayetteville Super Regional.

- The Razorbacks are 11-14 all-time in the College World Series and 4-3 in CWS openers.

## History in the Making

Andrew Benintendi is on the brink of becoming the third player in SEC history to lead the league in home runs and batting average, currently holding a one-homer lead and five-point edge in batting average. He would join Rafael Palmeiro (Miss State in '84) and Jeff Abbott (UK in '94) as the only players in conference history to accomplish the feat.

## DVH by the Numbers

- For the sixth time in his coaching career and fourth time in his Arkansas tenure, head coach Dave Van Horn is headed to Omaha.

- The Razorbacks are 4-6 in the College World Series under DVH.

- Arkansas' 3-2 win over Missouri State Sunday clinched another 40-win season for head coach Dave Van Horn, giving him 40-plus wins for the sixth time in the last seven years.

- The skipper picked up his 500th victory at Arkansas in the series finale at Auburn on April 5 and currently has 1,109 career wins in his 27-year career as a head coach.

- Over his 13 seasons at Arkansas, DVH has led the Razorbacks to four College World Series appearances, five Super Regionals, 13 NCAA Tournament berths, one Southeastern Conference overall title, three SEC Western Division championships and a total of 524 wins, averaging more than 40 wins per season.

## #BennyBaseball - 2015 NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

### #BennyBaseball Breakdown

- Is the first SEC Player of the Year in program history.
- Is the first National Player of the Year in program history.
- Is the first Razorback to win a major SEC award since Nick Schmidt won Pitcher of the Year in 2006.
- Is the first player in school history with at least 15 home runs and 20 stolen bases in a season.
- On pace to become the first player in SEC history to win the batting title, home run title and Player of the Year.
- On pace to become the third player in SEC history to finish the year as the league leader in home runs and batting average.
- Is currently tied for the national lead with 19 home runs on the year.
- Is one of only two players in the country with 15-plus home runs and 20-plus stolen bases (Only player in the CWS).
- Currently leads the SEC in batting average, home runs, slugging percentage, on base percentage and walks.
- Is 12 RBI's shy of becoming the second Triple Crown winner in SEC history.
- Leads all sophomores in the country in batting average, home runs and slugging percentage.
- One home run away from being one of five players in school history to reach 20 home runs in a season.

### Power

- Is tied for the national lead with 19 home runs on the year.
- Is third in the country with a .715 slugging percentage (Highest in the CWS).
- His current .715 slugging percentage ranks him seventh all-time in Razorback history.
- Ranks eighth in the SEC with 55 RBI's on the year (12 behind leader).
- Had a span of four home runs in six plate appearances against Mississippi Valley State and Kentucky.

### Consistency

- Leads the SEC with a .489 on base percentage (Highest in the CWS).
- Leads the SEC with a .380 batting average (Highest in the CWS).
- His .380 batting average would be the highest at Arkansas since 2010, when Zack Cox set the school record at .429.

### Speed

- Is second in the SEC with 158 total bases (six behind the leader).
- Is fourth in the SEC with 23 stolen bases on the year.
- Is third in the SEC with 61 runs scored.

### Dynamic Duo

Andrew Benintendi and Bobby Portis are one of only two baseball and men's basketball SEC Player of the Year combos in the same calendar year in league history. They join Florida's Mike Zunino and Chandler Persons in 2011 as the only other tandem to accomplish the feat.

### #BennyBoSox

- Was selected by the Boston Red Sox with the seventh overall pick in the 2015 MLB Draft

- Is the eighth first round draft pick in school history and first since Ryne Stanek in 2013.
- Is the third Arkansas player in the last two years selected by the Red Sox (Jalen Beeks, Michael Gunn).
- Was one of seven SEC players taken in the first round and third highest pick.

Trey Killian is coming off a quality start against Missouri State in the Fayetteville Super Regional, tossing 6.0 innings and giving up three runs on eight hits. He leads the team with seven quality starts on the year, including four in the last six starts. Killian has worked at least 6.0 innings in eight of his 14 starts and allowed one earned run or less six times this season. He makes his first College World Series appearance.

## Team Notables

- In six NCAA Tournament games, Arkansas out-hit its opponents three times, was out-hit twice and tallied equal hits once. The Razorbacks are 33-1 this season when out-hitting its opponents, but just 7-22 when being out-hit or having equal hits.

- After setting the Baum Stadium attendance record last Friday with 11,869, Razorback fans followed suit Saturday, breaking the record in less than 24 hours with 12,167 on hand. This past weekend, the top-three attendance marks at the eight Super Regional sites were all at Baum Stadium, totaling 35,730 over the three games.

- Since the series win against Kentucky April 10-12, the Razorbacks' pitching staff is 9-1 when it gets a quality start.

- TD Ameritrade Park is no stranger to the Razorbacks. Arkansas returns to Omaha, Nebraska for the second time in less than a month after taking down non-conference foe Creighton 6-2 on May 12.

- The Razorbacks have now won 7 of 10 conference series twice in the last three seasons (2015, 2013) as well as four-straight SEC road series for the first time since 2007.

## Well Done, Guys

Five current Arkansas players graduated the weekend of May 8-10, as Joe Serrano, Tyler Spoon, Krisjon Wilkerson, Jackson Lowery and Lance Phillips all received their diplomas from the University of Arkansas. Current student assistants Jake Wise and Tim Carver also graduated, while former players Cade Lynch and Geoffrey Davenport completed their degrees.

## Leading the Pack

Arkansas is the only team in the SEC to advance to each of the last 14 NCAA Regionals, and head coach Dave Van Horn is the only current head coach in the league to make six appearances in the College World Series.

## Road Warriors

Arkansas has gone to work on the road since April 18, winning 13 of its last 16 games away from Baum Stadium. The Razorbacks have been on the road for each of their last five NCAA Regionals, posting a record of 12-6, including a perfect 3-0 record during the 2012 Houston Regional and 2015 Stillwater Regional.

## Coming Full Circle

Michael Bernal saw his collegiate career come full circle in the Stillwater Regional after starting his career at Oklahoma State and redshirting his first year before transferring to New Mexico Junior College for one season. Bernal hit .400 last week in Stillwater and was named to the All-Tournament team with a 4-for-10 performance, including two runs scored and two RBI's.

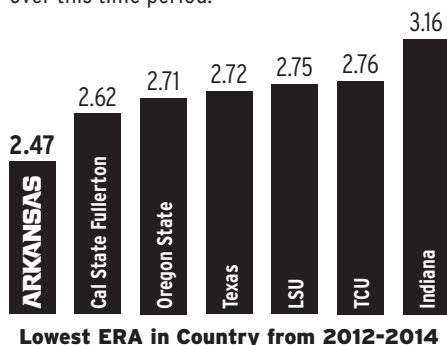

**SEC NEWS AND NOTES**

• The SEC has sent 50 teams to the College World Series since 1990. That was accomplished despite no SEC teams making the field in 1992. LSU has been to Omaha 13 times, Florida eight times, South Carolina six times, Georgia and Mississippi State five times, while Alabama, Arkansas and Tennessee have been three times each. Auburn and Vanderbilt have been twice.

• SEC teams have won 10 of the last 25 national championships, with LSU winning six (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000, 2009), South Carolina winning two (2010, 2011), Vanderbilt taking home the title in 2014 and Georgia claiming the 1990 title. The SEC has finished runner up seven times in that span, 1997, 2002, 2005, 2008, 2011, 2012 and 2013.

• SEC teams are 105-89 since 1990 in Omaha, a 54.1 winning percentage. Not counting games against each other, the SEC has posted an 80-64 record in the College World Series since 1990, a 55.6 winning percentage.

• The SEC has played 49 games in the "Final Four" of the College World Series since 1990, an average of over 1.5 per year. Only five times, 1992, 1994, 2003, 2006 and 2007 has the SEC failed to get a team to the "Final Four" of the CWS.

• The SEC has averaged over eight games played per year in the College World Series since 1990. In 2004, 12 of the 15 games played in Omaha involved a SEC team. In 1997, the SEC had a team in 13 of the 14 games played in the CWS. Since 1990, an SEC team has played in 169 of the 360 games in the College World Series, an amazing 47 percent of games. SEC teams played in 11 of the 16 in 2014.

• The SEC has sent 11 of its 14 schools to the College World Series since 1990 - Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt. Texas A&M also advanced three times since 1990 prior to joining SEC.

• Since 1990, 172 SEC squads have been invited to the NCAA Tournament, an average of better than seven per season. The SEC set yet another NCAA record in 2010 with 10 teams earning postseason berths. The SEC also

had a NCAA-record five teams earn regional host sites in 2004 and 2006.

• The SEC has had an NCAA-high 11 different teams compete in the 68-year history of the College World Series. In those appearances, the conference has registered a 127-127 record, a .500 winning percentage.

• Since 1990, 32 SEC squads have posted 50+ wins, while 123 have won 40+ games in a season.

• The SEC posted a 288-102 record against non-conference foes in 2014, a 73.8 winning percentage.

Now in his 13th season at the helm of the Arkansas baseball program in 2015, head coach Dave Van Horn has elevated the Razorbacks to one of the nation's premier teams year in and year out. In 13 years at Arkansas, Van Horn has led Arkansas to four College World Series appearances, 13 NCAA Tournament berths, one Southeastern Conference overall title, three SEC Western Division championships and averaged more than 40 wins a season.

In 2014, Van Horn led the Razorbacks to their 13th consecutive NCAA Tournament, making the program one of seven teams in the country to advance to the NCAA Tournament each of the last 13 seasons. Arkansas surged into the SEC Tournament as the No. 7 seed after winning six of its final seven regular season games.

Arkansas continued to push its best talent to the next level following the season, as six players were taken in the 2014 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, with five of those signing professional deals. In a testament to the development of players once they arrive on campus, since 2009, 35 of the 36 Arkansas players that have been drafted have improved their draft stock by becoming a Razorback.

Following the 2014 season, Van Horn's coaching duties were far from finished as he became the manager of the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team. Leading the best collegiate players in the country against some of the top teams in the world, Van Horn and Team USA battled the Chinese Taipei in a five-game series, Japan in a three-game set and made trips to The Netherlands and Cuba. The squad finished with an overall record of 18-8-2 and captured the Haarlem-Honkbal Week Championship in The Netherlands.

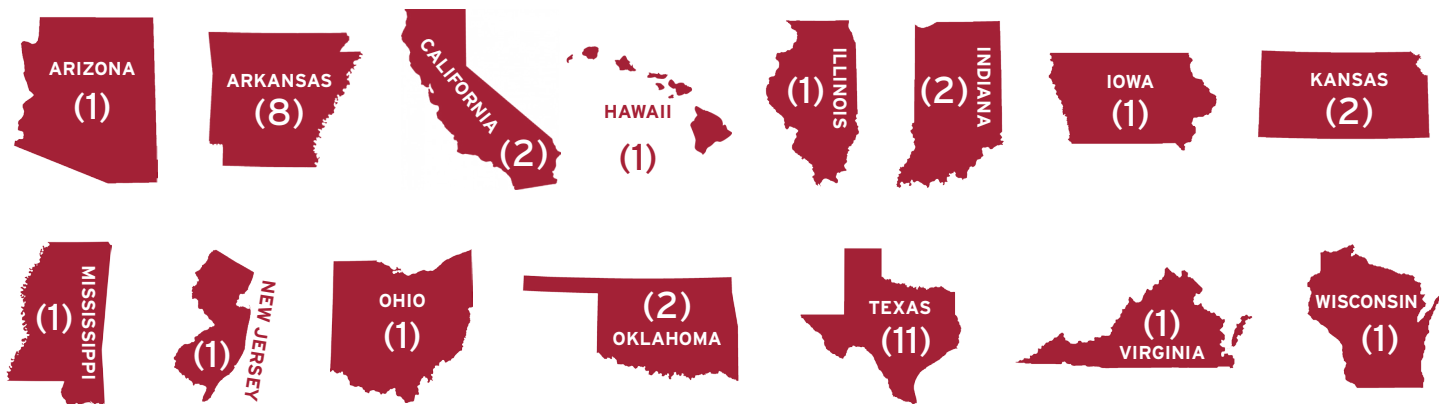

Credentials are non-transferable.

## INTERVIEW POLICY

Please direct all requests for interviews with coaches and players to David Beall. For home SEC weekends, Coach Dave Van Horn will hold his weekly press conference on Thursday with players and assistant coaches available following Thursday's practice. On road SEC weekends, Coach Van Horn will hold his weekly press conference on Wednesday with players and assistant coaches available following Wednesday's practice. Players are not available for interviews on gamedays, except for post-game interviews. Post-game press conferences are held in the indoor batting cages located down the third base line. Coach Van Horn will address the media first, followed by the two or three most requested Razorback players. In the event of a doubleheader, the only Arkansas player available between games for interviews is the starting pitcher of game one. The Arkansas clubhouse is off limits to the media at all times.

Members of the media may request to be added to the Arkansas communications baseball e-mail group. Subscribers will receive game notes, game stories and other information. ## GAMEDAY MEDIA SERVICES

The Arkansas communications staff provides scorecards, rosters, updated statistics and results for each team in the Baum Stadium press box prior to home games. Box scores, play-by-play and any postgame notes are disseminated approximately 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game. An Associated Press-style game story is also produced by the communications office. Members of the media may request these stories be sent to their organization via e-mail by contacting a member of the communications office.

# Zach Jackson brings electricity, maturity to Hogs

FAYETTEVILLE -- Arkansas sophomore pitcher Zach Jackson is not the same body type that arrived from Berryhill, Okla., 18 months ago. He's grown up. He's physically different.

Mentally, he grew up a long time ago. Helping to care for his injured mother during the summer before his senior year in high school likely added maturation and taught proper perspective.

Talking to Jackson for 30 minutes Thursday during Arkansas media day, you get his maturity. The understanding of what's important comes through after hearing him explain what his mother went through after a scary fall almost four years ago.

Gina and Kevin Jackson were coming back from the state baseball tournament in Shawnee, Okla., after Berryhill lost at the end of Zach's junior year in high school. Zach was on the team bus, well behind when his parents came upon a burning wreck on Interstate 40.

"We passed the wreck, and I didn't think much about it at first," he said. "Then, I called my parents. They didn't answer, and I got nervous. They still didn't answer about 30 minutes later."

Then, came a call from parents of a teammate with the knowledge of the accident. His mother had been seriously injured trying to help a drunk driver out of a one-car wreck.

Gina Jackson, running to the wreck in the dark, fell off the roadway overpass, hitting the pavement 35 feet below, breaking her pelvis, both hips, six ribs, both wrists and with serious head injuries. The good news: She's fine now after working through two months in a wheelchair and much rehab.

"She apologizes for everything," Zach said. "She hates that she put anyone through anything. About the only thing she has now is just her wrists, not much flexibility. But it was pretty scary. She was in the hospital in Oklahoma City for about one month.

"It was bad. When I first saw her in the hospital, she was on a board. She was such a trooper through all of it. But it could make you pretty emotional."

There was great emotion the next year, back to Shawnee for the state tournament when Berryhill broke through for the championship. It made for a great trip back over that same overpass.

There's no doubt Zach can get teary eyed just looking into the stands after games to see his mom.

"They are always going to be there for me," he said. "I'm not as emotional as I was at first. They'll be there. I know that. That summer when she was in rehab and we were taking care of her, I felt bad for going to a travel tournament to pitch, but she wanted me to go.

"She didn't want anyone to make a big deal of her."

Kevin Jackson told the Tulsa World about that night. He was busy taking care of the man he pulled out of the wreckage, not aware his wife had plunged off the bridge. Someone else mentioned there was

another victim of the wreck on the road below. That's when Kevin realized Gina was missing. When he got to her, all she wanted to do was apologize.

There's some of that in their son. He's still apologetic for not getting it done in the big spot at the end of the season when the Hogs ran out of pitching against Virginia in the NCAA tournament. He lasted three innings in his second start. He had been a solid reliever all season, the link to closer Jacob Stone. He pitched 42.2 innings, with 22 relief appearances, posting a 2.53 ERA.

Jackson is poised for a breakout year as a sophomore, perhaps in the starting rotation. He excites veteran pitching coach Dave Jorn, and that may not be easy to do after the run of amazing pitching over the past several seasons.

"He's got a lot of bullets," Jorn said. "There is no question he has the stuff. His change dives like a splitter."

There's also a blistering fastball and an electric, sharp breaker to make the changeup better.

"He's got enough stuff to turn over a lineup three times," Jorn said. "He just has to learn to quit wasting pitches."

Jackson is learning to command his fastball for location and strikes. He listens to Jorn's every word, especially when he was told to gain weight when he rolled in as a 175-pound freshman. He now packs 215 pounds on a 6-foot-3 frame. He is the Hogs' most intimidating mound presence.

"I always had the wide shoulders," he said. "But I was also always just so skinny. I got here, started lifting, and I ate everything in sight.

"I didn't have a change-up when I got here. Coach Jorn taught me the circle change and it's helped. I know whatever he tells me, I need to do. I couldn't get anywhere without what he's done with me. I was having a terrible fall my first year before he helped me."

Jorn tweaked his delivery, trying to slow everything down.

"He just wants to overthrow," Jorn said. "He throws it hard enough. With overthrowing comes tension, then you fly open and lose your release point.

"He can get too hyped up. That's what happened against Virginia. It was a big game against a good offense. He almost worked out of that jam."

To be honest, the umpire squeezed Jackson. He didn't get the call on several borderline pitches that let Virginia get some separation in the season-ender for the Hogs in a solid 40-25 campaign.

"It was definitely a good feeling to know that the team needed me and wanted me to pitch that game," Jackson said. "And, as dumb as it sounds, it was a good experience to fail and now to get a chance to come back and help my team this year."

Senior outfielder Joe Serrano calls the change-up "really nasty. It's gotten better and better. You can't stay back on it because of the velocity of the other two pitches. He's mature and very good. He's only a sophomore, but we consider him to be like a veteran, just phenomenal."



# Van Horn 2 shy of 500th victory with Hogs

FAYETTEVILLE -- Coach Dave Van Horn is a series victory away from his 500th victory at Arkansas, but in some ways the milestone accomplishment is just another number in the middle of an SEC season that is developing as his most trying with the Razorbacks.

Asked Wednesday how it felt to be "on the brink of 500" in his 13th season at Arkansas, Van Horn launched into a three-minute analysis on how the Razorbacks are 14-14 at this stage of the college baseball season.

A break-even record would be a new low point for Van Horn, who has 1,083 career victories, a career winning percentage of .674 and a personal streak of 16 consecutive appearances in the NCAA regionals. His worst record at Arkansas has been 10 games above .500 (34-24) in 2008, and the closest he's come to a losing record in 26 seasons as a head coach is a 24-20 mark in his first season at Nebraska in 1998.

The man who has led Arkansas to three College World Series appearances as a head coach and one as an assistant coach is as feisty and as blunt as he's ever been when discussing what's left for his current club.

"We still have 21 conference games left and five or six nonconference," he said. "We probably have to win about half of those conference games at a minimum and most of those nonconference games and find a way to get in that [NCAA] tournament.

"I've seen it where just all of a sudden the light comes on and you get on a streak, win five or six games in a row, even in league play, and it could really flip-flop you. We're in the middle of the pack, lower-middle, but if we could win a couple of series in a row we could pull ourselves out of it."

Van Horn, 54, laughed when the reporter clarified that he was asking about nearing 500 victories at Arkansas, not his team's winning percentage heading into its SEC series this weekend at Auburn, Ala.

"That just shows you where my mind is," Van Horn said. "Five hundred wins, that's great. It's not about, and it's never been about me. Maybe as a young coach, you maybe have an ego. But as a coach that's been around, it's really about the players and playing well and winning the number of games that you need so your team can advance."

After a few moments of further reflection, Van Horn continued.

"I am proud of the fact we're going to win 500 here, and hopefully 600 and 700," he said. "But it's attributed to a lot of things, and it really has to do with having players that show up every day and play hard and having good coaches that work hard and bring in good players and coach them up."

## **TURNED AWAY**

Van Horn was essentially hand-picked by one of his mentors, Arkansas coaching legend Norm DeBriyn, to succeed him in 2003. But the DeBriyn-Van Horn connection almost never happened after the Razorbacks jilted Van Horn during his senior year at Winnetonka High School in Kansas City, Mo., in 1979.

DeBriyn and his staff signed another infielder from Missouri that year, Chris Shaddy of Carthage, who would go on to play on the Class AAA level in the professional rank and whose son, Carson, is a redshirt freshman on the current roster.

"We could have gotten him out of high school and didn't take him," said DeBriyn, who now serves as an associate director of the Razorback Foundation.

"I was disappointed," Van Horn said. "For some reason, I always liked Arkansas. I can remember my senior year in high school, whenever I wore a hat, it was an Arkansas hat. People are always going, 'You like Arkansas?' Yeah, I like Arkansas.

"I was from Kansas City and I wasn't a Missouri Tiger, wasn't a KU, K-State, Oklahoma guy. It was Arkansas, straight south."

Van Horn could have signed with Wichita State or Kansas or other local schools for the 1980 season, but he went to McLennan (Texas) Community College for two seasons where he became an All-American and played twice in the NJCAA World Series.

When it was time for Van Horn to pick his major college destination in 1982, his list of suitors had grown significantly. Texas A&M was in the lead for his signature before Arkansas re-emerged.

Van Horn, a tenacious infielder, went on to become the team MVP and the Southwest Conference's newcomer of the year in his lone season at Arkansas before being chosen by the Atlanta Braves in the 10th round of the Major League Baseball draft.

"I was so fortunate that he wanted to be a Razorback or we would have lost him," DeBriyn said.

### **'I WAS HOOKED'**

Van Horn played in the Braves organization from the summer of 1982 into the 1984 season.

He said he realized that he wouldn't make it to the big leagues when he rounded the corner of a building one day and saw the heavily muscled Ron Gant, whom the Braves were trying to turn into an infielder.

Van Horn remembers a phone call with DeBriyn at the time in which he told his former coach, "I'm not a big-leaguer. I'm not big enough, strong enough, like these guys."

DeBriyn offered the 24-year-old Van Horn some advice.

"He said, 'You need to coach. Time goes by fast,' " Van Horn recalled. "I'll never forget Norm saying that."

Van Horn still needed to earn his degree, so he returned to Kansas City to take a couple of classes that fall and then started a four-year run at Arkansas as an undergraduate assistant and then as a graduate assistant the following semester.

DeBriyn turned the infielders over to Van Horn in 1985, a season in which the Razorbacks advanced to the College World Series, and let him scout and recruit, which was allowed by the NCAA at the time.

"I got to go on the road, get meal money, used my own car ... and I was hooked," Van Horn said. "I said, 'This is what I want to do the rest of my life.' "

Van Horn took a gamble by accepting the head coaching position at Texarkana Community College in 1989 at the age of 28, but the move eventually paid off. After five seasons there, one at Central Missouri State and three at Northwestern (La.) State, he hit the big time by landing the head coaching position at Nebraska.

After leading the Cornhuskers to back-to-back College World Series -- the first CWS berths in school history -- in his fourth and fifth seasons, DeBriyn came calling again and Van Horn was eager to listen.

Nebraska Athletic Director Bill Byrne, who hired Van Horn in 1998, wasn't prepared to let him slip away easily.

"When I got back from my trip here, Bill Byrne and I met in his office and he had a big packet," Van Horn said. "He goes, 'I've got something for you. You need to look at this before you make any decisions.' "

Van Horn said he slid the package back across the table, unopened, with a simple reply: "I'm going to Arkansas."

"That was tough," Van Horn said. "I felt like I was letting Nebraska down and I was letting Bill Byrne down, but in the same sense, I wanted to coach in the SEC and I wanted to coach at Arkansas."

#### **IN THE NOW**

Van Horn is determined to find the right buttons to push that will guide his 14-14 team back into a contending spot in the SEC West and into the program's 13th consecutive NCAA regional.

"This has been the most challenging year ever for me," he said. "I think I'm learning a lot about myself, trying to stay patient and trying to just do the right thing and get it right the rest of the year and get it right for next year."

Several upperclassmen talked Wednesday about their reasons for coming to play for Van Horn.

Senior outfielder Joe Serrano came to an Arkansas baseball camp as a high school sophomore from Tucson, Ariz., and was determined to get back to Fayetteville to spend his college days.

"It's been the best four years of my life," he said. Van Horn "knows a lot about the game. Some people might doubt his philosophies on hitting or fielding or base running or whatever, but at the end of the day he has the record to prove it.

"Honestly, he's almost like a Norm DeBriyn icon in Arkansas."

Junior pitcher Trey Killian said he learned a lot more about Van Horn last summer when he pitched on the USA Collegiate National team for which Van Horn served as manager.

"It was good for me and him," Killian said. "We grew closer and you can't replace that, playing for a coach that you like and you're close to and you know they care for you and you can actually have a conversation with him outside the realm of baseball."

Senior infielder Michael Bernal, a junior college signee last year, said Van Horn's presence was a big factor in his signing with the Razorbacks.

"He wins," Bernal said. "That's something I wanted to be a part of, somebody who knows how to win and who is very competitive. I feel like the way I play the game is sort of the same way he coaches the game: Play hard and get after it. That's something that definitely attracted me."

Van Horn's affection for Arkansas has worked out well for both parties.

"I was just called to come here, I feel like," he said. "It's been good."

# Beefed-up Benintendi gives Hogs more bang

FAYETTEVILLE -- Arkansas Coach Dave Van Horn would love to have Andrew Benintendi roaming center field and batting third for the Razorbacks next season, but he isn't counting on it.

Benintendi, a sophomore, is eligible for the Major League Baseball Draft because he turns 21 on July 6. The draft will be held June 8-10, and any college player who turns 21 within 45 days of the draft is eligible rather than having to wait until after his junior season.

"I don't see him coming back," Van Horn said. "The scouts love him."

What's not to love?

You want hitting? Benintendi is batting .350 going into Arkansas' three-game series against Kentucky that opens at 6:35 p.m. today at Baum Stadium.

Power? He leads the SEC and is tied for second nationally with 11 home runs.

Speed? He's stolen 12 bases in 14 attempts and scored 30 runs.

Defense? He hasn't committed an error in 33 games and has two assists throwing out base runners.

"His talent is really coming out now," Van Horn said. "Unless something crazy happens, we feel like he's going to have to turn down a lot of money to come back. We'd love to have him back, and maybe he'll want to come back. We'll see how that goes."

Benintendi said he has no idea how high he might be drafted if he maintains his level of play.

"I don't really want to think about that," he said.

With two swings against Mississippi Valley State on Wednesday, Benintendi doubled his home run total from 225 at-bats last season. He led off the third inning with an inside-the-park home run and capped his 3-for-3 game with a home run over the right-field fence in the sixth to help the Razorbacks to a 14-0 victory.

Four of Benintendi's home runs have come in SEC games. His only home run last season was against Eastern Illinois. He's averaging a home run every 10.6 at-bats this season.

"I'm not a home run hitter," he said. "I don't really pay attention to that. I don't think that will be my game later on, but I'll take it right now."

Van Horn said he expected Benintendi to hit more home runs this season but couldn't have predicted he'd already be the first Razorbacks player to hit 10 or more since Kyle Robinson had 10 in 2011.

"Andrew's got a lot of leverage in his swing," Van Horn said. "When he gets the barrel to the ball, it jumps. There are a lot of guys in the country that are bigger and stronger, but he's a really good baseball player and he's a tough out."



Part of Benintendi's power surge can be attributed to a livelier baseball being used this season.

The NCAA reported in early March home runs were up 40 percent -- from 0.33 per game to 0.47 -- compared to last season, but Benintendi already has increased his total by 1,000 percent with 21 regular-season games left.

What's had a bigger impact on his home run total was lifting weights last summer rather than playing baseball when he was sidelined for several weeks because of a strained right quadriceps muscle. Benintendi, 5-10, said he added about 15 pounds to get his weight to 180.

"When he came back this fall, the dude had pipes," Arkansas senior outfielder Joe Serrano said, referring to Benintendi's biceps. "It was unreal. He looked like he went from a little boy to a big ol' man.

"He's definitely got a beach bod now, and he's swinging well and with more confidence."

Benintendi said he is a smarter hitter and has made the adjustment from high school to college pitchers, who often throw off-speed pitches in fastball counts.

"I'm starting to trust my hands," he said. "If I'm sitting off-speed, I can still hit the fastball."

Benintendi hit .276 last season after being the American Coaches Association National Player of the Year at Cincinnati Madeira High School, where he hit .564 as a senior. He was a 31st-round pick by his hometown Reds but likely would have gone in the top 10 rounds if he hadn't told scouts he would attend Arkansas unless offered signing bonus money in the first- or second-round range.

"As a freshman he had a roller-coaster season," Van Horn said. "He'd never failed before, but as a freshman you're going to fail sometimes, I don't care how good you are."

Benintendi said he took last season as a learning experience and remained confident. He didn't expect to have so many home runs but said he's not surprised he's hitting well and driving in runs.

"I think I knew I had it in me," Benintendi said. "It's just a matter of going out there and doing it."

# Benintendi, SEC hitters pounding new baseball, offense on the rise

For a quick window into how much college baseball has changed over the past year, look no further than the stat line of Arkansas center fielder Andrew Benintendi.

The 5-foot-10, 180-pound sophomore hit just one homer in 225 at-bats last season, watching as a few potential long balls fell just shy of the fence.

This year has been a different story.

He's already hit 14 out of the park and there's still a month remaining in the regular season.

The NCAA's new baseball — which has flatter seams than the previous version — was introduced this spring with the hope that it would increase offense.

So far, it has worked.

"I haven't really changed my approach from last season, but I do think I'm a little stronger which has helped," Benintendi said. "There's no doubt the new baseball has helped some, too. I didn't think I would hit this many (homers) and really, I'm not thinking about it. I'm just trying to hit it hard into the gap and fortunately some are leaving the park."

Benintendi's huge power spike might be an anomaly, but offensive numbers are up across the Southeastern Conference. The 14 teams have already combined for 399 homers through Tuesday's games after hitting just 392 all of last season.

With the weather warming up, don't expect the trend to stop any time soon. Pitching and defense are still important, but the SEC's elite are all hitting the ball with authority.

"It's partly because of the new baseball and partly because of some really good hitters," Missouri coach Tim Jamieson said. "But mostly, it's about confidence. Guys have noticed that the new ball carries and they're really attacking. It's what everyone is talking about."

The offensive increase isn't all about homers. Four teams — LSU, Texas A&M, Florida and Kentucky — have a team batting average above .300. Last season, no one reached that mark.

LSU coach Paul Mainieri said he's much less likely to call for a sacrifice bunt this spring, playing for the big inning instead of trying to squeeze out one run.

The Tigers (35-6, 12-5 SEC) lead the league with a .320 batting average and are tied third with 38 homers. Texas A&M (36-5, 12-5) has a league-leading 47 homers. The two teams — ranked No. 1 and No. 2, respectively, in the d1baseball.com poll — meet this weekend for a three-game series in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

LSU's Kade Scivicque, who is hitting .396 with five homers, leads an offense that returned eight of nine players from last season. He says the ball has had a huge effect on hitters' psyche.

“When you have a positive mindset in the batter’s box, good things happen,” Scivicque said. “You’re getting good swings, getting some backspin and the ball is carrying.”

Benintendi is one of five SEC players who has reached double digits in homers. Florida’s J.J. Schwarz has 13 and teammate Harrison Bader has 11, Tennessee’s Christin Stewart has 12 and Texas A&M’s Logan Taylor has 10.

Only two players — Kentucky’s A.J. Reed and Mississippi’s Sikes Orvis — had more than 10 homers last season.

College baseball’s home run rate is still much lower than its heyday in the late 1990s, but the threat of a long ball has certainly increased. Benintendi said everyone he’s talked to has been pleased with the new baseball and the results it has produced.

His coach agrees.

“To me, this is a lot more like baseball,” Arkansas’ Dave Van Horn said. “The last few years, if you were down three runs going into the 7th inning, the game was basically over because it was so hard to hit the ball over someone’s head. That’s not the case anymore.”

# Razorbacks clean up with 3-for-1 deal

FAYETTEVILLE -- Tucker Pennell set a Razorbacks' 2015 season record last weekend when Arkansas won 2 of 3 from Mississippi State at Baum Stadium.

The junior college transfer became Arkansas' first catcher in 2015 to start all three games of a SEC series.

"It was weird," Arkansas sophomore catcher Alex Gosser of North Little Rock said with a tongue-in-cheek smile. "We wondered what the heck is going on?"

It never got so weird last weekend for Pennell to finish a game.

This season it seems about as rare for an Arkansas catcher to finish what he starts as it does for an Arkansas catcher to start three consecutive games.

At some point, redshirt freshman Carson Shaddy, the son of 1980s Razorbacks shortstop Chris Shaddy, generally replaces Pennell or Gosser as a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner and catches at least awhile.

"It is what it is," Shaddy said earlier this season of the shuffling. "This is what gives our team the best chance of winning, so you go with it."

Dave Van Horn, Arkansas' coach since 2003, said he usually relies on one main catcher and occasionally two.

That format has been broken by the evolution of Pennell, the best catcher but the lightest-hitting of the bunch (.180 batting average), Gosser, the middle man hitting .222, and Shaddy, the best hitter (.348) and the fastest of the three but also least experienced.

"I have never gone three, but we have used three in one game multi times this year and most of those games we have won," Van Horn said. "They all bring something a little different."

All three appreciate what each brings.

"We all have each other's back no matter who is playing," Pennell said. "If one of us isn't there that day, we expect the other catcher to come pick us up whether it be offensively or defensively."

All appreciate none are wearing down like one regular catcher tends to wane down the SEC stretch.

"That's a huge plus," Pennell said.

Seems it might keep the pitchers unsettled, throwing to two, sometimes three different catchers in a game, but apparently not.

"All of our catchers pretty much have the same styles," Gosser said. "I don't know if [pitchers] prefer one over others, but they just kind of go with the flow."

Even if they don't know the flow, like when Gosser unmasked between innings to the bemusement of pitcher James Teague.

"I know I caught Teague one weekend, and he said, 'I didn't even know that was you. I thought Tucker was still catching,' " Gosser said. "They don't really pay too much attention to it."

Although he's mostly thrown to Pennell this year, sophomore starter Dominic Taccolini said he's comfortable throwing to all three and finished his winning stint against Mississippi State throwing to Shaddy.

"I've thrown to Gosser and Shaddy since last year with bullpens and stuff," Taccolini said. "They are all good catchers, so it's really not a big deal. You get used to it."



# Change in swing propelled Benintendi

FAYETTEVILLE -- It's easy to see a difference in Andrew Benintendi this season.

The stats tell the story. Arkansas' starting center fielder is attempting to become the first player since Rafael Palmeiro to win the SEC triple crown with a .386 batting average, 15 home runs and 46 RBIs.

In a game that finds value in statistics more than any other, Benintendi is one of college baseball's most valuable players. He leads the nation in home runs, has stolen 20 bases and has reached base safely in 20 consecutive games.

He's one of 30 players on the watch list for the Golden Spikes Award, the Heisman Trophy of sorts for college baseball. It's an astonishing turnaround for a player who hit .276 with one home run and 27 RBIs a year ago.

"I couldn't have projected he'd hit 15 home runs; I thought he'd hit eight to 10," Arkansas coach Dave Van Horn said. "He's got a good swing and when everything is working and you make contact right, things just jump."

What changed? You name it.

First, Benintendi changed his body. He elected to not play summer baseball last year, instead focusing on the weight room, helping him gain about 15 pounds of mostly muscle.

Then there was a change in equipment. A flatter seam baseball has contributed to the offensive surge, not only for Benintendi, but across college baseball, where home runs have increased about 40 percent since last season.

But perhaps the biggest change for Benintendi has been his approach at the plate. A more open batting stance last season yielded disappointing results for the player named the nation's best coming out of high school.

Van Horn and batting coach Tony Vitello talked to him about changing his stance throughout last season, but it wasn't until pitching coach Dave Jorn mentioned something did a switch finally click.

"When you are a freshman in this league, you are facing some pretty good stuff," Jorn said. "What I saw was a lot of motion in his stance and his swing. He was open and striding, and diving at the ball. There were a lot of pitches that were just eating him up.

"My job is to watch hitters and get them out. You watch what they are doing. I could see what they were doing to him and I tried to help him."

Benintendi made the switch during the Razorbacks' series against LSU in Baton Rouge last April. He didn't record a hit the first game, but had four hits and a walk in his final seven at-bats of the series.

He added three more hits the next weekend in a series win over eventual national champion Vanderbilt. He raised his batting average 13 points over the final eight weeks of the season, an uncommon trend during the portion of the season when batters tend to wear down.

With a less defined leg kick and ability to generate more power from his upper and lower body, Benintendi hasn't slowed down since, battering opposing pitchers on just about any mistake over the plate. Last Sunday, Alabama pitcher Geoffrey Bramblett left two pitches in Benintendi's wheelhouse. The left-hander sent one into the opposite field for an RBI single and pulled the other one into the opposing bullpen for a solo home run.

"To me, his approach is good because he goes the other way," Van Horn said. "For a while pitchers wouldn't throw him in. Alabama decided they were going to throw him in and got him out a little bit early, but then it didn't work the last couple of times.

"He's adjusted with the pitches and taken what they've given him. The thing I like is he's taking his walks (34 this year). If you take walks, you'll hit for (good) average. That's what has advanced him as a hitter."

That kind of versatility has made Benintendi one of the toughest outs in the SEC. Unlike many with his kind of home run numbers, he can do more than just crush a pitch left over the plate.

His home run at Alabama was his first in more than three weeks. During the interim he went through one stretch in which he reached base in 15 of 16 plate appearances, including nine straight times to close out a series upset of then-No. 1 Texas A&M in College Station.

He'll turn 21 in July, making him eligible for the MLB Draft as a sophomore. He is expected to be one of the top college bats on draft boards.

That means that unless the No. 20 Razorbacks host an NCAA regional next month, this weekend's series against Tennessee will almost assuredly be his last at Baum Stadium - one last chance for the home crowd to see one of the better swings to come through Fayetteville.

"It didn't take much with someone like Andrew because he's a good baseball guy and has good understanding," Jorn said. "He's real good. He won't be here next year."

# State of the Hogs: Jorn and Benny

FAYETTEVILLE -- Don't look now, but this may be the last weekend to get a glimpse of the hottest thing on campus, the Arkansas baseball team. And, in case you weren't paying attention, that may mean your last look at Andrew Benintendi.

It's senior weekend, with graduation ceremonies scheduled for Saturday afternoon. There's even some juniors likely playing their last games at Baum Stadium, including Tyler Spoon and Trey Killian. Joe Serrano and Spoon will walk across the Bud Walton Arena stage at 3 p.m., then hustle to batting practice.

But there won't be any ceremony for Benintendi, the sophomore center fielder setting the SEC on its ear and leading the Razorbacks to six straight series victories. The Hogs will try to become the first team in school history to win seven straight in the SEC when Tennessee arrives Friday.

Benintendi leads the SEC in batting average (.386) and home runs (15). He's not far back of the RBI lead. Florida's JJ Schwarz has 50 and Benintendi is fifth with 46.

It's not a surprise that Benintendi is doing well. He was the national high school player of the year at Cincinnati Madiera where he hit .542 over a four-year career. He finished as Ohio's all-time leader in runs scored (199) and second in hits (213).

It's just that he made a huge jump from his freshman season when he hit .276 for the Hogs. But it all began to change midway through the SEC season last year. He was hitting .263. Head coach Dave Van Horn noted it was probably the first time in his career that Benintendi "had failed."

Van Horn joined hitting coach Tony Vitello in suggesting a change in his batting stance. Both wanted Benintendi to close his lead foot and soften his stride. Finally, pitching coach Dave Jorn hit the right cord, perhaps a little tougher approach, as the Hogs were preparing for a road series at LSU.

"We'd all been on him about being too open," Van Horn said Wednesday. "I told him he was off balance. Dave (Jorn) just kept on him. Dave can do that, like he's hacked off."

Van Horn can bring the tough love, but there may not be anyone as blunt or tough as Jorn, a former minor league pitching coach with the Yankees, Diamondbacks and Mets.

Clearly, Jorn is one of the top pitching coaches in college baseball. He's worked magic with the UA pitchers in the last month. The bullpen is suddenly solid and freshman Keaton McKinney has blossomed as an ace on Sunday.

But, don't think Jorn is JUST a pitching coach. He is going to help the UA hitters, too, if he sees a flaw. Last year, he got his point across to Benintendi, helping him make the adjustment to salty SEC pitching.

"When you are a freshman in this league, you are facing some pretty good stuff," Jorn said. "What I saw was a lot of motion in his stance, swing. He was open and striding and diving at the ball. There were a lot of pitches that were just eating him up.

"Those are things I saw. My job is to watch hitters and get them out. You watch what they are doing. I could see what they were doing to him and I tried to help him."

Benintendi said he noticed an immediate difference. He raised his average to .276 by season's end. Most see their overall average drop in SEC play. So the change was working.

Van Horn had some more advice at season's end. Go home and lift weights and take a summer off. He'd worn himself down from going from baseball to basketball and back the previous four seasons. Lift weight and get stronger. Benintendi added almost 15 pounds of muscle over the summer. With a more balanced swing, more strength and a baseball that travels further, Benintendi has rolled through his sophomore year.

Jorn didn't want to take the credit. He said Benintendi put in the work and is just that talented.

"It doesn't take much with someone like Andrew because he's a good baseball guy, has good understanding," Jorn said. "He's real good. He won't be here next year."

Benintendi doesn't want to think about that. And, he doesn't want to think about playing his last game at Baum this weekend. The Hogs still have an outside chance of playing host to a regional, but Jorn's point is on target.

"If it happens, it happens," Benintendi said. "I really am not looking ahead. I'm not worried about any of that. I'm just trying to win games."

That's exactly the approach Van Horn has preached, but the Arkansas coach knows Jorn is correct.

"He could be a sandwich pick," Van Horn said, noting the major league draft's round between the first and second. "The scouts love him."

Scouts are allowed to interview players on Mondays. There has been a long line waiting on Benintendi.

"I think the most has been seven," Benintendi said of his visits. "They just want to explain the process and get to know you."

It's been fun for Tyler Spoon to watch. As a hot fourth-year junior scheduled to pick up his diploma on Saturday, Spoon also has been attractive to pro scouts during the Monday interviews.

"I'm probably not getting as many questions as Andrew," Spoon said. "They are really interested in him because he's clearly a top guy."

Teammates love Benintendi. They've had fun teasing him as the national attention grows.

"We've gotten him pretty good at times," Joe Serrano said. "The thing about it, he's not any different now than he was when he got here. He does not like all of the attention. We know that. So we kid him about it. He knows we have good intentions."

Pitcher Jacob Stone said there was no one got Benintendi out in the fall, but that didn't set him apart at the time.

"We weren't getting anyone out," Stone said. "We knew some of it was the new baseball, but our offense was tough to handle in the fall. To be honest, everyone was hitting us. We were questioning our ability (as pitchers).

"So I can't say that we saw 15 home runs coming from him. He didn't have a great freshman year.

"What I can tell you is that we never saw him change as a person. He's a great teammate and an even better person. He's humble and cares about his family and plays his heart out until someone tears his jersey away from him."

Benintendi insists the goal is not to hit home runs. He's just trying to hit it hard. But, if someone pitches him inside, his hands are so quick, the ball jumps out down the line in right.

"I don't think about them," he said. "I didn't think I'd hit 15, but I'll take it."

There is nothing about him that's not perfect mentally. There are two big series left with Tennessee and Georgia that occupy his mind, not a possible SEC triple crown, only the second in league history. Rafael Palmeiro is the only other to accomplish the feat, in 1984.

"Mentally, we just want to put ourselves in as good of a position in the standings as we can," he said. "You just have to keep winning the next game. If we slack off, we could be back where we were."

The Hogs are 14-10 in SEC play after starting the SEC season at 1-5.

"We just try to stay on an even keel," he said. "We always felt like we had ability. We just had to stay together."

Actually, what the Hogs had to do was climb up on Andrew Benintendi's back.



# Dominant Jackson Leads Hogs To CWS

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — This isn't Dave Van Horn's typical blueprint.

Since Van Horn's first season as Arkansas' head coach in 2003, his teams have almost always been loaded with frontline arms. The Hogs ranked in the nation's top 30 in ERA in each of the last five years, including top-five rankings in 2012 and 2013.

This year, Arkansas ranks 106th in Division I with a 4.11 ERA — the worst ERA ranking of the Van Horn era. When the Hogs last went to Omaha in 2012, they could roll out one big arm after another — including Ryne Stanek and Barrett Astin and Colby Suggs and Nolan Sanburn, all of whom would go on to be top-three-rounds draft picks.

This year, the Razorbacks have just one big gun on the mound, and they fired it in Sunday's winner-takes-all super regional battle against Missouri State. Sophomore closer Zach Jackson was utterly overpowering, striking out six and allowing just one baserunner over 3 2/3 innings of relief to nail down a 3-2 win and send the Hogs to Omaha for the fourth time in the Van Horn era.

The last out came down to a battle between Jackson and Missouri State star Tate Matheny. Jackson won the eight-pitch battle by getting Matheny to strike out, then turned toward the Arkansas dugout on the first-base side and leapt for joy five times before he was swallowed by a sea of Razorbacks.

"I feel like as a college baseball player, you live for that moment right there," Jackson said.

Jackson was a specter looming over the entire game. He had pitched just one inning in the series heading into Sunday, and both dugouts knew he was likely to pitch multiple innings Sunday — which made it imperative for Missouri State not to fall behind early. But the Hogs jumped on MSU starter Jordan Knutson for three runs in the first, and Missouri State could not maximize its own scoring chances in the first three innings against James Teague, scoring just one run while stranding seven.

"If we get a few knocks early, maybe Jackson's not in a save situation," Missouri State coach Keith Guttin said. "That was pretty critical today."

Credit Teague, a swingman this year for Arkansas, for battling his way through those three trying innings without allowing a big blow, then working a 1-2-3 fourth inning before handing the ball over to sidewinder Lance Phillips. He got through the fifth (stranding another man in scoring position), and Van Horn told pitching coach Dave Jorntoft between innings that the time to summon Jackson was rapidly approaching, because he didn't like the swings he was seeing from Arkansas' hitters after that first inning, so the game remained close.

With men on first and second and one out in the sixth, the Hogs entrusted the game to Jackson. He allowed an RBI single to the first batter he faced, Dylan Becker — and then proceeded to retire the final 11 batters of the game. His 94-95 mph fastball was overpowering, and his 83-84 power curve was characteristically unfair.

“He’s a big leaguer,” Guttin said. “He’s got a breaking ball that very few people on earth can hit.”

And when Jackson is pounding the strike zone, like he did Sunday — good luck. He has missed bats at a very impressive rate this year, striking out 87 in 56.2 innings of work — but he also has 37 walks. Van Horn said he was a little concerned when Jackson came out and threw his first pitch of the ninth inning arm-side and high, but he was able to rein in his adrenaline and harness his control to get those last three outs. He’s got classic closer makeup — he relishes those kinds of situations.

“He’s a really good person. I mean, he’s a tremendous kid,” Van Horn said. “Off the field, he’s just a nice person. But when he gets between the lines, he gets that look in his eye. And I wouldn’t want to cross him.”

All season long, Arkansas has had to scrap and claw on the mound, piecing it together by any means necessary. Trey Killian is a battler, but his stuff has been underwhelming and his ERA is 4.74. Keaton McKinney has shown flashes, but he works in the mid-to-upper-80s, and he has struggled since injuring his hip down the stretch. Dominic Taccolini has been up and down, and he was unavailable this weekend after getting hospitalized for an undisclosed condition last weekend. Jackson Lowery has been outstanding as a long man, and Teague and Phillips have done good work too.

But Jackson is the only Razorback with an ERA below 3, and their only game-changing arm. Still, this hard-nosed bunch found a way to get to Omaha. Van Horn compared the run a little bit to his first Arkansas CWS team back in 2004.

“When we won the regional here against Florida State, we were done,” Van Horn said. “And we went to the World Series, we were done. I as a coach, Coach Jörn, we were going, ‘We’re exhausted. The players are exhausted.’ We got up there, and you could just tell we were done. I’m hoping this team isn’t like that. I feel like this team is a little bit deeper offensively. We are very thin on the mound, as far as experience and guys that we feel are ready to get out hitters at this level right now. So that’ll be our greatest challenge.”

So far, Arkansas has been able to overcome that challenge. It’s a testament to the superb coaching staff, the talented lineup, the veteran leadership, the gritty pitching staff — and the electrifying Jackson.

# Arkansas baseball: Andrew Benintendi enjoys breakout year

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. -- Andrew Benintendi spent his first season at Arkansas adjusting to college baseball.

Now it's the rest of the country that has been forced to adjust to the sophomore outfielder, one of the top prospects in next week's Major League Baseball draft and a driving force behind a team two wins from its first College World Series in three years. The Southeastern Conference Player of the Year is hitting .390 with 18 home runs and 22 steals this season.

The Razorbacks (38-22) take on Missouri State (48-10) this weekend in a best-of-three Super Regional, with the winner advancing to Omaha. It's a position few expected Arkansas to be in after an 11-12 start to the season, one the Razorbacks have reached in large part to Benintendi.

"We wouldn't be sitting here where we are if Andrew didn't have the year he had," Arkansas coach Dave Van Horn said. "It's obvious."

Benintendi's ascent didn't happen as quickly as many had expected. A Cincinnati native and a high school All-American, Benintendi started all but one game for the Razorbacks last season as a freshman and played well -- just not up to his video game-like standards.

He hit .276 and scored 45 runs in 61 games, playing his best toward the end of the season, but the overall numbers weren't up to the expectations of the left-handed slugger who hit .564 as a senior in high school.

"I think I kind of expected to come in here and put up some big numbers, and I think I put a lot of pressure on myself to do that, too," Benintendi said. "When I wasn't producing like I thought I should, it was frustrating."

Benintendi's biggest difficulty as a freshman was controlling his emotions during the up-and-down season. His occasional outbursts were met with quick coaching from Van Horn and hitting coach Tony Vitello, who worked with the outfielder to become more controlled during and after at-bats, including the bad ones.

Help was also offered by older teammates, who Vitello said were impressed with Benintendi's humility and team approach.

"He wouldn't have had that support system if he was a punk, or only concerned with himself," Vitello said. "I think that speaks to what kind of kid he is, and what others think of him."

Benintendi listened to his coaches, just as he listened to them when they brought up the possibility of taking a summer away from playing to fully heal some nagging injuries and add strength.

The result was the 5-foot-10 Benintendi, who arrived in Fayetteville weighing 160 pounds, began this season weighing 180 pounds -- a key reason his home run total has jumped from only one a year ago to one off the national lead this season.

Of course, there's also the matter of Benintendi's talent.

Benintendi, 20, was also a standout basketball player in high school, but it's his ability to hit -- born out of childhood hitting sessions with his father, Chris -- that impresses his coaches and teammates.

"The game just comes slow to him," Vitello said.

Benintendi began this year projected as a fifth- or sixth-round draft pick by many, but his breakout season has vaulted him into the top 10 of many projections.

It's enough to cause the sophomore to reflect on his hard work and good fortune for a moment. Only that moment, however, since he hopes to continue playing for Arkansas past this weekend at the College World Series.

"It's very exciting, but at the same time I'm excited for it all to be over and just know where I'll end up," Benintendi said.

# Hogs motivated by earlier Omaha trip

FAYETTEVILLE -- Twenty-seven days before Arkansas clinched another trip to the College World Series, the Razorbacks departed on a six-hour bus trip to Omaha, Neb.

In its final nonconference game of the regular season, Arkansas played a game against Creighton at TD Ameritrade Park, home of the College World Series. The Razorbacks' 6-2 victory over the Bluejays received little fanfare at the time, but it planted a seed in the minds of the Arkansas players.

"Our strength coach [Mike Strouhal] said to enjoy that ride up there because we're going to make it again," center fielder Andrew Benintendi said.

With the postseason approaching, Arkansas Coach Dave Van Horn downplayed any significance to the trip at the time. Players said he even told them to stop taking pictures of the ballpark once they arrived in downtown Omaha.

Van Horn said he scheduled the game against Creighton to fill the Razorbacks' 56-game schedule. Creighton Coach Ed Servais approached him about playing there when the Bluejays had an opponent back out of a midweek game for the final week of the regular season.

Arkansas agreed to the game, Van Horn said, when the Razorbacks' final conference series was scheduled to be on the road. Creighton also had to agree to a return trip to Baum Stadium.

In retrospect, Van Horn said Sunday that the decision to play there likely motivated his team.

"Once we got there and saw it, in the back of my mind I'm thinking, 'Boy it would be nice to get this team back,'" Van Horn said. "Honestly it was kind of like, that's probably out there a little bit. But you never know, man. You've got to have hope, right?"

The victory over Creighton improved the Razorbacks' record to 31-19.

"We were starting to play well," third baseman Bobby Wernes said. "It just kind of put a picture in our head."

The SEC scheduled the Razorbacks' final series at Georgia, so the bus ride to Omaha started what would morph into a 13-day road trip.

Following the Creighton game, Arkansas players took a charter jet from Omaha to Athens, Ga. Following the series there, the team bused to Hoover, Ala., for the SEC Tournament.

Van Horn called the trip a bonding experience for his players. The Razorbacks are 10-4 with six victories over teams that made the NCAA Tournament since leaving for the trip May 11.

"[Before going to Creighton] these guys had kind of already forged an attitude," Arkansas assistant coach Tony Vitello said following Sunday's victory over Missouri State. "It was a matter of just finishing out the rest of the way.

"Going to Creighton had something to do with this."



# State of the Hogs: Pitching Comes Through

Arkansas had enough pitching to get to closer Zach Jackson. The Hogs rode the big righthander to Omaha in a 3-2 victory over Missouri State on Sunday at Baum Stadium.

Zach Jackson performed like a big leaguer, just what Missouri State coach Keith Guttin called the Arkansas closer.

But it was Lance Phillips that provided the bridge from starter James Teague to set up Jackson's late-game dominance.

Yes, it was the same Lance Phillips that Arkansas coach Dave Van Horn called the last man to make the roster in the fall. Phillips faced seven batters in the middle of the game to earn his second career victory to send the Razorbacks to the College World Series in Omaha.

Guess where Phillips recorded his only other victory in his two seasons at Arkansas? You got it, it was May 12 when he pitched one inning as the Hogs powered past Creighton in TD Ameritrade Park – in Omaha.

The Hogs pounced on Missouri State freshman Jordan Knutson for three runs in the top of the first. Pitching coach Dave Jorn's thin staff made it stand up with James Teague fighting through four innings, then Phillips getting the game to the magnificent Jackson, the sophomore with the three best pitches on the staff.

Jackson struck out six of the 12 batters he faced to earn the save, his ninth. No one has touched the Berryhill, Okla., product since about the time Van Horn told him Team USA had tabbed him to close on its summer tour.

The Hogs have struggled to find enough pitchers all season. With potential starter Dominic Taccolini out with a bad shoulder, they were even thinner over the last two weekends. Teague even pitched an inning Friday and was having trouble with his elbow on Sunday.

"He wasn't 100 percent," said Jorn, for 19 seasons the UA pitching coach. "He couldn't straighten out his elbow today. I didn't know how long he could go."

Missouri State was on him early, but couldn't get the key hit. The Bears stranded seven in the first three innings when they stroked five hits. They may not have scored at all on Teague, except for a rare error by Bobby Wernes to set up an unearned run in the third.

Still, Jorn was ready to send Van Horn to get him early. He knew things were not right in the second inning.

"I told him we were going to take him out, but just give us a little time to get someone ready," Jorn said. "I knew he was hurting. But he said, 'I'm good. I got it.'"

"Then, he struck out the guy to end the third and he got them 1-2-3 in the fourth. But I knew that was about all he had."

Van Horn didn't want to go with Jackson for five innings. He's prone to throw a lot of pitches and the idea was to somehow get to the sixth or seventh.

"We wanted Lance to just get us a few outs," Van Horn said. "He did. He really did great. They got a bloop hit in the sixth and then the walk. I decided not to wait for the seventh."

Jackson gave up an RBI single to let in one of the inherited runners. But it was lights out the rest of the way. He retired the final 11 Bears. They didn't make solid contact in the last three innings.

"He's a big leaguer," said Guttin, the fiesty MSU coach. "He has a breaking ball that very few people on earth can hit."

Combine that with a fast ball that is clocked from 93 to 95 mph and a great change-up, Jackson does have big league stuff. Teammates say those three pitches are the best three on the staff.

"He had it all working," Jorn said. "I probably called more fast balls today because that was for strikes. But at the end with (Tate) Matheny, it was the curve ball. We weren't going to give him anything else."

Van Horn said the pitching staff has been a work in progress all season. Phillips probably wasn't in the original roster plans in the fall with some fire balling youngsters rolling on to campus. Jorn changed his arm slot last season when he was ineffective. With a new side arm delivery, he started to get outs late in fall camp.

"He just kept getting better and better," Van Horn said. "He showed us a knack of getting two, three guys out. We were just so thin on arms and we had some freshmen who were not ready mentally. Lance was just more mature. He was a guy we could run out there and get a couple of guys."

"But I will say that he's about the last guy to make the roster in the fall. But he's had a good year."

Hitting coach Tony Vitello applauded Jorn and the pitchers for getting it done and said it shouldn't surprise that the three who pitched Sunday are perhaps the hardest workers.

"I got here last year and I spent a lot of long hours in my office, just getting organized," he said. "I go back to when I got here and I'd think I was the last guy in this place and I'd leave and it would be James, Zach and Lance in our indoor area, or out there in the outfield running or throwing. They were the last three a lot."

"I remember some last year that Lance didn't always travel. But he'd be working and working to try to get better. He never quit working. It was non-stop and to see him today, that makes you feel good."

Teague was beaming and promised he'd be fine by the time he pitched again in Omaha.

"You go out there a lot of the times and you aren't perfect and you pitch and today was no different," he said. "You get in front of this crowd and you are pumped. You just know you have to be the bridge to the back end with Zach.

"We don't have a lot of arms and this year was definitely a struggle at some points. People thought we were nothing. We were walking in guys. But we kept working and started gaining some confidence and growing up.

"Today, I definitely did not have good stuff. My fast ball was up and they hit it. I just knew I had to give us a few innings, though. If we can get it to Zach, we know what we've got."

Outfielder Tyler Spoon said it was the same as usual, with Jackson. He said when the bullpen call goes for Jackson, the three outfielders converge in center field for a conversation.

"Me and Andrew (Benintendi) say, 'It's over,' because there's not many going to get a hit off Zach," Spoon said. "Our pitchers have been incredible."

The Hogs have been more of an offensive club this year, but Vitello said that's mainly because of the way the scholarship money worked out for 2015.

"We've got a lot of scholarships in offense, but it will balance out in the future," Vitello said. "What you see is that Coach Jorn got a little bit from each one of our pitchers. It took a little while for his master plan to work out, but he did it."

Jorn said the work ethic was always there from the thin staff.

"And we were thin," he said. "Without Taccolini, we just were even thinner. Not a lot of bullets. But Jackson gave us everything he had and he's a diehard Razorback. He is pretty good when he steps out there.

"It's a great group, though. They are close and they grind. The real positive is that they have a ton of the intangibles."

Van Horn talked of Jackson's fire.

"Obviously, he's talented," Van Horn said. "But he's a great person, too. His parents did a great job. You wouldn't want to meet a nicer person. But when he steps between those lines, he changes. I wouldn't want to face him."

Jorn thought Jackson could be a starter coming into the fall. But there were issues with control in the fall and again after the holidays. He threw too many pitches to last long and there were times even as a reliever when Jorn wondered if he would make it out of his first inning. No one hit him, but he might walk the bases loaded several times in a game.

"Yeah, we thought he'd start," Jorn said. "But you need the starter to fill up the zone and get you some innings. He wasn't doing that."

And, it didn't help that Trey Killian was on the mend to open the season. He missed the first three weeks trying to get his arm into shape after sitting out with tendinitis in his elbow. It was Killian who helped plot a Van Horn ice bath after the game.

"Clark Eagan and Andrew Benintendi got the bucket," Killian said. "My job was to go hug Coach Van Horn and hold him there for a little bit. He was trying to get away, but I just kept hugging him. It was great."

"This is so much fun. This is the closest team I've played on, a real family. It wasn't always going great, but we stayed together and you see how it's turned out."

"It's incredible what we've done since the middle of March. We were 12-13. We just kept grinding. We went to Omaha last month and said we'd be back or something like that."

The coaches tried to downplay some of that on the Omaha trip.

"The guys were really excited to get up there when we played Creighton," Vitello said. "They were fired up and taking a lot of pictures of the park and talking about going back. Coach Van Horn told them to calm down, but maybe going to Creighton had something to do with what we've done."

"This is pretty exciting. The dog pile was amazing. Guys were cheering, then crying, hugging, then cheering and hugging some more."

Van Horn showed some rare emotion in the post-game interviews. He talked about the 2012 team with all of the pitching talent but without much offensive punch. Midway during the season, there was talk about pulling Spoon's redshirt.

"I brought him into my office to talk about it," Van Horn said. "I talked to him a little bit and I just decided not to do it and sent him out of my office. I was going to play him, but his look talked me out of it."

So when school ended, the redshirts went to their summer assignments, Spoon to a league in Alaska.

"So we win at Baylor and I get this text from Tyler," said Van Horn, his voice cracking. "It says, 'Congrats, good luck in Omaha, wish I was there.' It tore me up. I'm extremely proud to get him to Omaha."

Van Horn said it really hasn't hit him what another trip to Omaha means. It's his sixth, fourth with the Hogs. He said you never know when you've made your last.

"It's an unbelievable feeling," he said. "It will probably hit me when I have to start answering 100 texts tonight.

"It's tough to go. I feel fortunate and happy."

It's really tough when your team sits 12-13 in March.

# Red Sox draft Arkansas outfielder seventh overall

Outfielder Andrew Benintendi has Arkansas in contention at the College World Series.

Andrew Benintendi's sophomore year was supposed to represent a steppingstone to a standout junior year that would make him an early selection in the 2016 draft. The 20-year-old skipped a step.

The Red Sox tabbed Benintendi, a lefthanded-hitting outfielder at the University of Arkansas, with the seventh overall selection in Monday's first round of the MLB amateur draft.

Benintendi had a monster sophomore campaign that vaulted him near the top of the draft.

Though listed at 5 feet 10 inches and 175 pounds, Benintendi added 15 pounds of muscle between his freshman and sophomore seasons and returned as a five-tool force.

Benintendi held his own as a freshman, hitting .278 with a .368 OBP, .333 slugging mark, one homer, and 10 extra-base hits. But when he returned as a sophomore, his strength gains — as well as a return to full health following wrist and hamstring injuries in his freshman year — set in motion a dazzling season.

"The leap that Andrew made is a little bit unusual," said Sox amateur scouting director Mike Rikard. "Not many guys make that type of stride from their freshman year to their sophomore year."

Benintendi hit .380 this season with a .489 OBP and .715 slugging mark while leading Division 1 in homers (19) and swiping 23 bases in 27 attempts. He was named Southeastern Conference Player of the Year — ahead of shortstops Dansby Swanson of Vanderbilt and Alex Bregman of LSU, the top two picks in the draft — and proved the key figure in vaulting Arkansas to the College World Series.

His emergence forced scouts to scramble in an effort to gauge a player who hadn't been prominent in their coverage plans at the start of the year.

"It got crazy. It got crazy. He handled it pretty well. I think the only time it bothered him a little bit was the SEC tournament, because it got ridiculous," said Arkansas coach Dave Van Horn. "We'd be over taking batting practice at a high school down the road and all the scouts would leave the stadium. There'd be a game going on but they'd come down to watch him take batting practice. He got done and they'd leave. There'd be 30 of them."

The Sox, of course, were almost surely represented, with area scout Chris Mears serving as point man for their efforts. The Sox came to view Benintendi as a well-rounded player with top-of-the-order potential who can play center field.

"He's good at a lot of things. He's not just a good hitter," said Van Horn. "He's got some power. He's an outstanding baserunner. He has a really good feel on the bases for stealing bases. He's very fast. He's an



outstanding defender. He's got a strong arm and it's accurate. He's got a lot of tools. I think he'll move quick through the minor leagues. He just has a lot of baseball instincts. He's a great player."

That combination made Benintendi a clear choice, according to Sox general manager Ben Cherington.

"He's someone who's always played at the highest level of competition available to him. Putting that together with his performance, his physical skills, getting to know him as a person as we were able to do this spring, you put it all together and when it came time for our pick at 7, he was the top player on our board," said Cherington. "It was obvious who we were taking. We were really excited to take him."

The sentiment was reciprocated by Benintendi. The Cincinnati native said that he grew up as a Red Sox fan, having found inspiration in a fellow undersized player in Dustin Pedroia. Now, he can look forward to the opportunity to call Pedroia his teammate when he makes his first visit to Fenway Park.

"[Pedroia's] obviously not the biggest guy, but the way he competes and the way he works is motivating to me," said Benintendi. "Being picked was extremely exciting. I put in a lot of hard work to this point and there's a lot more work to do but I'm extremely excited. It'll be exciting to start."

# Sox view Benintendi as top of the order bat

**With No. 7 overall pick in Draft, club takes sophomore outfielder from Arkansas**

BOSTON -- The Red Sox snagged perhaps the nation's best college hitter in Andrew Benintendi with the seventh pick in the Draft on Thursday night.

As a draft-eligible sophomore out of Arkansas, Benintendi had a breakout season, hitting .380 while leading Division 1 with 19 homers. The left-handed hitter stole 23 bases and was the SEC Player of the Year. He is also a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award as the nation's best collegiate baseball player.

The Red Sox monitored the leap closely and pounced.

"Obviously he took a big jump this year," said Red Sox general manager Ben Cherington. "Despite only two years of college baseball, there's quite a bit of history that we have with him going back to high school and he's someone who's always played at the highest level of competition that's been available to him, whether it's been in high school or college.

"Put that together with his performance, and his physical skills and getting to know him as a person as we were able to do this spring, when it got time to our pick at 7, he was the top player on the board, and it was obvious who we were taking. We're really excited to take him."

A player is Draft-eligible as a sophomore if he is 21 or turns 21 within 45 days following the Draft. Benintendi turns 21 on July 6, so he falls within that window. A player who is a Draft-eligible sophomore is often perceived to have more leverage in negotiations because he has two years of college eligibility left.

For Benintendi, it was rewarding to see all of his recent dedication pay off.

After adding roughly 15 pounds of muscle, Benintendi had a big jump across the board offensively this season after hitting just one homer in 2014.

"This offseason I put in a lot of work, working on my body, changing up my diet," said Benintendi. "I put on 15 pounds this past summer, and coming back and playing fall ball, I started to notice -- especially with the new baseballs in college, the lower seams this year -- that me putting on some muscle played a big factor."

Benintendi has the speed to play center field and is getting ready to play in the College World Series.

"As far as the player and his toolset, we think Andrew is a very well-rounded player," said Red Sox director of player development Mike Rikard. "There are so many things we like about him. He's very athletic, he can run, he can play center field. We see him eventually as a top of the order type of bat."

Benintendi has the type of opposite-field stroke that could allow him to thrive at Fenway Park.

"That's actually one of the things we like the most about Andrew is that he's a very well-rounded offensive player," said Rikard. "I think there's no doubt he'll be able to control the strike zone and recognize pitches at a high level, which gives us a lot of comfort in projecting him as a Major League player. But he also has power and he has power to both sides of the field. I think he's going to be a guy who can work counts, for sure, but he's also got a lot of the good hitter's traits we like as well as far as being aggressive and controlling the strike zone."

As excited as Benintendi is to become a professional baseball player, the best part of his college career is still to come.

"I told him he and his teammates still had something to accomplish," said Cherington. "It's an incredible opportunity to be able to play in the College World Series. Not a lot of guys get to do that. So we'll be rooting for him and it will be a great experience for his sake and his teammates' sake, so hopefully Arkansas wins a few more games. Whenever that is over, we look forward to getting an opportunity to talk to him and hopefully getting him into a Red Sox uniform."

The Cincinnati native joins Jeff King (No. 1 pick in 1986) and Kevin McReynolds (sixth pick in 1981) as Razorback players to be selected in the first seven picks of the Draft.

The Draft continues on Tuesday with Rounds 3-10. The MLB.com preview show begins at 12:30 p.m. ET, with exclusive coverage of Rounds 3-10 beginning at 1 p.m. ET.

# Boston drafts Benintendi seventh overall

FAYETTEVILLE — Arkansas outfielder Andrew Benintendi was drafted by the Boston Red Sox in the first round of the MLB Draft on Monday.

Benintendi, a sophomore, was the seventh overall pick of the draft. He is expected to sign a contract with the Red Sox before the July 17 deadline and forego his final two years with the Razorbacks.

According to Baseball America, the signing bonus value for the seventh pick is more than \$3.59 million.

"It's a great organization and they've got a great history," Benintendi said. "Growing up, I was a big Red Sox fan.

"Being picked, it was extremely exciting. My family was here - my mom, dad and two sisters. I put in a lot of work to get to this point and it's starting to pay off."

Boston general manager Ben Cherington said the organization has kept up with Benintendi since he was a prep standout in Cincinnati. Despite being named national player of the year as a high school senior, Benintendi was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds in the 31st round of the 2013 draft because he expressed a desire to attend college.

"He's someone who has always played at the highest level of competition that has been available to him, whether it be at high school or in college," Cherington said. "When you put that together with his performance, his physical skills and getting to know him as a person as we were able to do this spring, when we got to our pick at seven he was our player on the board and it was obvious who we were taking.

"We're really excited to take him."

Benintendi sky-rocketed up draft boards the last two months, leaving scouts scrambling to watch his games in person. He is tied for the NCAA lead in home runs with 19 entering this weekend's College World Series.

He is batting .380 with 55 RBIs, and also has 23 stolen bases.

"I got off to a slow start and I think I might have been thinking about (the draft) a little too much," Benintendi said. "I just settled down and started playing a lot better. Our team got on a roll about a month ago and I was satisfied with where I was, and I realized I had a good chance to move up pretty high. I'm extremely excited right now. It's a great feeling."

Benintendi became the first Arkansas player to be named the Southeastern Conference player of the year. He is also a finalist for both the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy, which are presented to the nation's best player.

Collegiate Baseball newspaper named Benintendi its national player of the year last month.

Benintendi is the fifth Arkansas position player and eighth overall to be drafted in the first round. He is the Razorbacks' fifth player selected in the first round since 2007.

The MLB Draft continues Tuesday and Wednesday with 40 rounds in all. Other Arkansas players expected to be drafted include pitcher Trey Killian, outfielder Tyler Spoon and infielder Bobby Wernes.

College players are draft-eligible if they have completed their junior year of college or turn 21 years old within 45 days of the draft. Benintendi turns 21 on July 6.

The Razorbacks are scheduled to play Virginia on Saturday at the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska.

# #Omahogs not trendy in March

FAYETTEVILLE -- Eleven weeks ago the Arkansas Razorbacks were fighting to get over .500.

Now the Razorbacks are headed to Omaha, Neb., the promised land for college baseball teams.

Arkansas beat Missouri State 3-2 Sunday at Baum Stadium in the deciding game of an NCAA Super Regional to advance to the College World Series.

The Razorbacks (40-23) open with Virginia (39-22) at 2 p.m. Saturday at TD Ameritrade Ballpark in Omaha.

Any thought of the Razorbacks playing in the College World Series seemed absurd in late March when Arkansas lost to Memphis 5-4 at Dickey-Stephens Park in North Little Rock and fell to 11-12 overall.

"I'd have been excited to go to a regional at that point," Arkansas junior right fielder Tyler Spoon said.

The Razorbacks beat the Tigers 7-3 in Memphis the next night, then returned home and beat Ole Miss 2 of 3 games -- the start of a stretch in which Arkansas won seven SEC series and split a two-game rain-shortened series against Tennessee.

"I think it was the second game against Memphis that was kind of our turnaround," Spoon said. "Things just started clicking for us."

Arkansas pitcher Zach Jackson, who retired the final 11 Missouri State batters Sunday to earn his ninth save, said the Razorbacks relied on each other and the coaching staff to get through the tough early part of the season.

"I feel like a lot of people doubted us," Jackson said. "That drove us and brought us closer together when we were struggling. We're closer than ever right now, and it's paid off."

Arkansas Coach Dave Van Horn said the turnaround included "a little bit of everything" from a lot of players.

"I give credit to the players for hanging in there and not getting so frustrated that they shut it down a little bit," Van Horn said. "I give credit to our coaches for being very positive and motivating these kids."

"I can't tell you how many times we would tell them if we keep working it's going to turn around. Just keep working."

"We're going to right this ship and things are going to start going our way, because if it could go wrong, it went wrong."

The Razorbacks' endured a six-game losing streak in early March, including losses at home to Loyola Marymount 9-0 and Gonzaga 15-5. They blew a four-run ninth-inning lead at Vanderbilt and lost 8-7 in 12 innings in the SEC opener and were swept in a three-game series by the Commodores.

"We walked a lot of batters," Van Horn said. "We hit a lot of batters. We couldn't really figure it out on the mound.

"We knew Zach was our closer, but we couldn't get it to him."

They can now.

The Razorbacks have won their past four one-run games, including 4-3 over St. John's to take the Stillwater regional title. They opened the SEC Tournament by beating Tennessee 2-1 and Florida 7-6.

"We just find ways to win," said Arkansas sophomore center fielder Andrew Benintendi, the SEC player of the year, who was the seventh player selected Monday night in Major League Baseball's first-year draft. "It might not always be the prettiest, but we're scrappy and we'll fight to the end.

"We're never out of a game."

Hitting coach Tony Vitello said players focused on the smaller picture, starting with being among the 12 teams to qualify for the SEC Tournament.

"Step 1, make sure we make the SEC Tournament and turn it into step 2 and make sure we make the NCAA Tournament," Vitello said. "Step 3 was to host a regional, and we didn't, but we were able to get in front of Baum Stadium's fans again and that was a big-time weapon for us."

Spoon said that about three weeks ago the players started believing they could advance to the College World Series.

"Just the way this team has been playing, the way we've been pitching, hitting," Spoon said. "It's just been an incredible team effort these last two months or so.

"It's been a lot of fun, and now we're going to Omaha."



# Beni heading to Beantown

UA slugger taken 7th by Boston

FAYETTEVILLE -- Andrew Benintendi's huge sophomore season took another dramatic turn Monday when the Boston Red Sox took the Arkansas center fielder with the No. 7 pick in the major league amateur draft.

"I'm excited today happened," Benintendi said during a teleconference. "I'm excited to join the Red Sox and excited to get started."

Benintendi, who was compared to former New York Yankees great Don Mattingly by Harold Reynolds of the MLB Network, became the first Arkansas player to earn SEC player of the year honors and the first to be named a national player of the year when Collegiate Baseball magazine gave him that award.

He is the third-highest Razorback ever taken in the draft, behind Jeff King, who was the No. 1 overall selection by the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1986, and Kevin McReynolds, who was taken No. 6 by the San Diego Padres in 1981. He is the eighth Arkansas player to be drafted in the first round and the highest Razorbacks selection since King.

Benintendi said the possibility of being draft eligible might have played a role in his slow start this season, but that he settled in and started playing better as the team made its move.

"About a month ago, where I was personally, I was pretty satisfied with where I was," he said. "I realized I may have a good chance to go pretty high. I'm extremely excited right now."

Benintendi led the SEC with a .415 batting average and 16 home runs during the regular season. A finalist for the Golden Spikes Award and the Dick Howser Trophy, he will take a .380 average with 19 home runs, 55 RBI and 23 stolen bases into the College World Series on Saturday.

Benintendi, 5-10, 180 pounds, has been on the Red Sox's radar since his high school days in Cincinnati.

"We think Andrew is a very well-rounded player," said Mike Rikard, the Red Sox's director of amateur scouting. "There's so many things we like about him. He's very athletic. He can run. He can play center field. We see him eventually as a top of the order type of bat."

Ben Cherington, Boston's executive vice president and general manager, said the Red Sox liked how well Benintendi competed as a freshman in the SEC and the big leap he took this season.

"You just put it all together and when it got time for our pick at [No.] 7, he was the top player on the board. It was obvious who we were taking and we were really excited to take him."

Benintendi made 60 starts as a freshman, batting .276 with 8 doubles, 1 home run, 27 RBI and 45 runs scored. He attributed his big leap in 2015 to adding 15 pounds during the summer and the lower-seamed baseballs.

Benintendi said the Red Sox are a great organization with a great history.

"I looked up to guys like Dustin Pedroia, who is not the biggest guy," Benintendi said. "But I love the way he competes."

Benintendi said his approach as a hitter is to "hit the ball hard, whether it be the first pitch or working the count."

Rikard said one of the biggest enticements for the Red Sox to draft Benintendi was his hitting style.

"I think there's no doubt that he's going to be able to control the strike zone and recognize pitches at a high level, which gives us a lot of comfort in projecting him as a major league player," Rikard said.

"But he also has power to both sides of the field. I think he's going to be a guy who can work counts, for sure, but he's also got a lot of the good hitter's traits that we like, as far as being aggressive and controlling the strike zone."

Reynolds said Benintendi jumped out at him during video study.

"I was really impressed with his ability to make contact to all fields and the power jumped out," Reynolds said. "I think he's a really good athlete. I like the pick."

# Benintendi Goes Seventh To Boston

Arkansas star Andrew Benintendi's meteoric rise up the Major League Baseball draft chart ended with a top 10 selection.

The Boston Red Sox chose Benintendi with the seventh pick and he was one of four SEC picks in top eight behind top pick Dansby Swanson (Arizona) of Vanderbilt and No. 2 pick Alex Bregman (Houston) of LSU and ahead of Vanderbilt pitcher Carson Fulmer (Chicago White Sox).

Benintendi, currently hitting .380 with 19 homers, 55 RBI and 23 stolen bases this season heading into this weekend's College World Series, was named the Collegiate Baseball National Player of the Year and the SEC Player of the Year over the other three.

"Obviously it is a great organization and they've got great history and growing up I was a big Red Sox fan," Benintendi said on a teleconference call the Red Sox set up for the media, "I looked up to guys like Dustin Pedroia because obviously I am not the biggest guy and the way he competes and works is a motivating thing for me.

"Being picked, it was extremely exciting. My family was here - my mom, dad and two sisters. I put in a lot of hard work to get to this point and it is started to pay off. I have a lot more work to do, but I am extremely excited and it is going to be exciting to start."

Boston general manager Ben Cherrington first congratulated Benintendi and Arkansas on making the College World Series, where the Razorbacks will open against Virginia Saturday at 2 p.m.

"First I want to just take a moment to congratulate Andrew on a terrific season for himself personally and also for his team," Sherrington said. "We got a chance to meet with him before and talk to him earlier tonight and I told him that he and his teammates still had something to accomplish and that it is an incredible opportunity to play in the College World Series. Not a lot of guys get to do that so we will be rooting for him and it will be a great experience.

"For his sake and his teammates' sake, hopefully Arkansas will win a few more games. Whenever that is over we look forward to talk to him and hope we get him in a Red Sox uniform.

Cherrington was asked about taking a college player with just two years experience and one year being far superior to the other.

"...If you sort of take a step back and look at his years at Arkansas and put it into context and where he was playing, as a freshman to step into an every day role in what most people would say is the toughest conference in college baseball, his performance is actually pretty solid for a freshman in that conference. It is a big jump in competition.

"I think in some ways that gave us even more comfort as we look at the whole thing. Obviously he took a big jump this year, but despite only two years of college baseball, there is quite a bit of history that we have with him going back to high school. He is someone that has always played at the highest level of competition that has been available to him whether it is high school or college.

"Put that together with his performance and his physical skills and getting to know him as a person as we were able to do this spring, altogether when it got time for our pick at number seven, he was our player on the board and it was just obvious who we were taking and we were really excited to take him."

Mike Rikard, the Red Sox director of scouting, noted on a teleconference that his organization had scouted Benintendi back when he was in high school in Cincinnati.

"We have history going back to high school with Andrew and our scouts have really done an outstanding job of just recognizing his ability at an early age," Rickard said. "Coming into this year, it became more and more evident that Andrew just started to perform and that he would probably work his way into our attention that we were considering. Andrew really earned that by just making people take notice and performing as well as he did.

"As far as a player and his tool set, we think Andrew is a very well-rounded player. Some of the things that we really like about him is that he is athletic, he can run, he can play center field. We see him eventually as a top of the order bat."

He becomes the Razorbacks' fifth first-round pick since 2007 – a number second only in the SEC over that time to Vanderbilt's seven - and is Arkansas' highest draft pick since Jeff King went No. 1 overall to Pittsburgh back in 1986.

Benintendi had his great year after starting off slow and admitted he was thinking a little about the draft.

"At the beginning of the year, it was on my mind a little bit and I got off to a kind of a slow start," Benintendi said. "I think I may have been thinking about it a little too much. Then I just settled down, starting just playing baseball and playing a lot better and our team got on a roll about a month ago and so did I personally and I was pretty satisfied with where I was.

"I knew I had a chance to go pretty high and I am extremely excited now. It is a great feeling."

Benintendi was asked about going from one homer as a freshman to almost 20 as a sophomore. "This offseason I put in a lot of work, working on my body, changing up my diet and I put on about 15 pounds this past summer," Benintendi said. "Playing fall ball, especially with the new baseball and the lower seam. With that and me putting on some muscle played a big factor." DIBaseball.com analyst Frankie Piliere noted Boston had been targeting Benintendi.

"The Red Sox didn't hide their affinity for Benintendi - they were all over this erupting draft eligible sophomore," Piliere said. "What a metamorphosis he went through since last year. Power to all fields and a very compact stroke.

D1Baseball.com analyst Aaron Fitt was on hand in Fayetteville over the weekend and had a chance to see Benintendi up close.

"Saw Benintendi show opposite-field power here in Fayetteville on Friday -- took Jon Harris deep to left field on a slider away," Fitt said moments after the selection. " Really like his lefthanded swing, mature approach and bat speed.

"Quick-twitch guy. But I have a hard time coming up with a good comp for him -- don't see a lot of outfielders his size becoming big league impact players. He may break the mold."

"I think this last week or two, I haven't been playing as well, but I don't think it has been because of the pressure," Benintendi said. "I think it's just baseball and baseball's a tough game. Obviously you are going to fail some times, but I don't see putting pressure on myself on top of that. It may have impacted me a little bit, but I am excited that today has happened and I am going to be glad to start." "We started off really slow, were 12-13 at one point and 1-5 in the SEC," Benintendi said. "I think our second SEC series was against LSU and I think after that we begin to turn it around and started clicking as a team. Everybody kind of fell into their own role and knowing what they had to do to win games. And now we are headed to the World Series and it's been a very exciting year."

"It is going to be fun this next week."

# Five things to know about Arkansas' baseball team headed to CWS

Arkansas defeated Missouri State 3-2 on Sunday in the finals of the 2015 Fayetteville Super Regional and now advances to the College World Series. The Razorbacks will face Virginia on Saturday in the first round.

Here's five things to know about this team that had a losing record in late March.

## 1. Slow start in SEC yes, But.....

Yes the Razorbacks started 1-5 in the SEC and yes that's a slow start for any program, much less the Razorbacks. However, truth be told a lot of good teams might have started with a similar record considering the competition. The Hogs went to Vanderbilt for three games and then came home to host LSU. The Razorbacks were swept by Vandy and won the first game of the LSU series only to lose the next two games. Two of the losses to Vandy were by one run, 8-7 in 12 innings and 1-0.

After LSU, Arkansas never lost another weekend series the rest of the season. Arkansas' success is even more remarkable when one considers Dominic Taccolini was lost late in season with a medical issue and Keaton McKinney has battled a hip injury. Taccolini and McKinney were two of Arkansas' three starters behind Trey Killian much of the season.

## 2. Found the Closer

Going into the season, Arkansas Coach Dave Van Horn didn't know who his starter would be. However, it didn't take long before he knew Zach Jackson would be that person. Jackson actually started the season in the starting rotation, but was a closer as the season progressed. On Sunday, Jackson faced 12 batters and retired 11 of them. He allowed a single to his first hitter he faced and then never allowed anyone else to reach base. Missouri State Coach Keith Guttin was asked about Jackson's curveball after Sunday's game.

"Jackson's a big leaguer," Guttin said. "He's got a breaking ball that very few people on earth can hit."

Jackson has 87 strikeouts in 56 2/3 innings this season and has an ERA of 1.91. He was told of Guttin's praise.

"I'll take that as a huge compliment," Jackson said. "When I'm out there, I have faith in Coach (Dave) Horn with every pitch he's calling."

## 3. Van Horn is a Regular

This is Van Horn's sixth trip to the College World Series as a head coach. He did it twice at Nebraska, 2001 and 2002, and then at Arkansas in 2004, 2009 and 2012 prior to this year. In all, this will be the eighth trip for the Razorbacks in their program history. Prior to Van Horn, the Razorbacks went in 1979, 1985, 1987 and 1989.

#### 4. Arkansas' Outfield

The Arkansas outfield as a whole may be the best in school history. Joe Serrano is a senior, Tyler Spoon a junior and Andrew Benintendi a sophomore. All will likely leave after the season and head to play professional baseball. Spoon had an outstanding season and for him to return for his senior season would be surprising. Benintendi will be taken in the first round of the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft tonight. Van Horn knows he won't have his sophomore standout next season.

"He's not coming back," Van Horn said. "I wouldn't either."

Benintendi is expected to go anywhere from No. 7 to No. 11 in the first round. That is an area where a player usually gets 3-4 million signing bonus. The Boston Red Sox, Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds are his likely landing spots. There is virtually no chance if he slips past the Red Sox (7) and the Cubs (9) the Reds won't take him at No. 11.

#### 5. Seen This Place Before

The College World Series is played in Omaha's TD Ameritrade Park. The Hogs defeated Creighton 6-2 there on May 12. Van Horn talked about the reluctant decision to schedule a non-conference road game that late in season.

"Once we got there and saw it in the back of my mind I'm thinking, 'Boy It would be nice to get this team back here,'" Van Horn said.

Serrano is the only Arkansas player who played in the College World Series in 2012. Spoon was on that team, but redshirted and didn't make the trip to Omaha.



# Boston Red Sox have history with first-rounder Andrew Benintendi; GM Ben Cherington: 'It was obvious who we were taking'

While the rest of the college baseball world seemingly didn't know much about Arkansas outfielder Andrew Benintendi until he burst onto the scene this season, the Red Sox did.

Boston has kept a close eye on the 5-foot-10, 180-pound Cincinnati native since high school when he played for a high level summer ball league based in Cincinnati called the Midland Redskins.

So when Benintendi was still on the board when it came time for the Red Sox to select the No. 7 pick on Monday night in the MLB Draft, Benintendi was a no-brainer.

(Interestingly, the last time the Red Sox selected a college bat with their first pick in the draft was Deven Marrero in 2012. He, too, played for the Midland Redskins as did former Red Sox first-rounders Ryan Dent (2007) and Kolbrin Vitek (2010)).

"We've known (Benintendi) back to high school," Red Sox general manager Ben Cherington said on a conference call Monday night. "He's someone who's always played at the highest level of competition that's been available to him whether that's in high school or college and you put that together with this performance, his physical skills and getting to know him as a person as we were able to do this spring, you put it all together and when it got time to our pick at seven he was the top player on the board and it was obvious who we were taking."

The left-handed hitter had a pedestrian freshman season (.276/.368/.333, one homer, 27 RBI) but Cherington attributed that to the transition to the Southeastern Conference, perennially one of the toughest in college ball.

"If you sort of take a step back and look at his first year at Arkansas and put it in context of where he was playing as a freshman to step into an everyday role in what most people would say is the toughest conference in college baseball, his performance is actually pretty solid for a freshman in that conference," Cherington said. "It's a big jump in competition so I think in some ways that gave us even more comfort as we looked at the whole thing and obviously he took a big jump this year so there is, despite only two years of college baseball, there's quite a bit of history we have with him going back to high school."

Instead of playing college summer ball after his freshman year, Benintendi chose to stay at school and hit the weight room to add muscle to his slight frame. He put on 15 pounds last summer and reaped the benefits when the Razorbacks began their fall ball schedule in September.

After a slow start in March, Benintendi took off and became one of the top hitters in Division I this season. He earned SEC Player of the Year honors after leading the conference in batting average, slugging, on-base percentage, home runs, and walks.

The 20-year-old hit .380 with a .489 on-base percentage with 13 doubles, two triples, 19 home runs, 55 RBIs in 63 games for the Razorbacks. He drew 47 walks compared to 31 strikeouts and stole 23 bases in 27 attempts. Arkansas is headed to the College World Series and Benintendi is currently tied for the Division I lead in home runs and has a .715 slugging percentage, third-best in the nation.

He also became the first player in Arkansas team history to be named National Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball.

"This offseason I put in a lot of work, working on my body, changing up my diet and put on 15 pounds (last) summer," Benintendi said on the conference call. "Coming back in the fall, playing fall ball, I started to notice especially with the new baseballs in college with the lower seam this year, I think that, with me putting on some muscle played a big factor."

The Red Sox drafted two lefthanded-pitchers from Arkansas, Jalen Beeks and Michael Gunn, last season, but Cherington said it was mere coincidence and more a reflection of the work scout Chris Mears has done for the organization in identifying talent in his area.

Draft experts have tabbed Benintendi as a Jacoby Ellsbury type -- a left-handed hitting outfielder with above average speed and decent power.

In a long-term projection, the Red Sox see him as a leadoff hitter.

"He's a very well-rounded offensive player," Red Sox director of amateur scouting Mike Rikard said. "I think there's no doubt he's going to be able to control the strike zone and recognize pitches at a high level which gives us comfort in projecting him as a major league player. But he also has power and he has power to both sides of the field so I think he's going to be a guy who can work counts for sure but he's also got a lot of the good hitters' traits that we like as well as far as being aggressive and controlling the strike zone."

The Red Sox won't be able to negotiate with Benintendi until after the Razorbacks finish their season, but Boston is confident it will be able to come to an agreement with the outfielder.

The Red Sox drafted Arkansas outfielder Andrew Benintendi with their first-round pick (No. 7 overall) in the MLB Draft on Monday night.

The draft-eligible sophomore became the first player in Arkansas history named the National Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball for hitting finishing the regular season with a .391 average, .492 OBP and a .738 slugging percentage.

He was tied for second in the country with 18 home runs and also had 22 steals on 26 attempts.

The speedy outfielder hit for power this season although this was the first season he did so. Benintendi spent last summer in the weight room and the added muscle gave a significant boost to his power numbers.

Baseball America's scouting report on Benintendi says he has, "the ability to drive the ball to all fields but with most of his home runs coming to his pull side. And he does it with a very balanced approach and excellent pitch recognition. He's striking out in only 11 percent of plate appearances, while getting extra-base hits in 13 percent of his plate appearances."

Sports Illustrated called Benintendi a "Jacoby Ellsbury clone with a strong power/speed combination."

The Razorbacks are headed to the College World Series.

The Red Sox have a history with drafting players from Arkansas. The team selected two pitchers from Arkansas - lefthanders Jalen Beeks and Michael Gunn - last season.

Boston doesn't have another pick until the third round, which begins on Tuesday. The Red Sox forfeited a second round pick and a competitive balance round B pick in signing free agents Pablo Sandoval and Hanley Ramirez this offseason.

# Red Sox draft powerful OF Andrew Benintendi at No. 7

With the No. 7 overall pick in this year's MLB draft, the Red Sox had an opportunity to draft a future superstar.

If Andrew Benintendi continues playing the way he has this season at the University of Arkansas, the Sox may have found one.

The Sox selected the 20-year-old Benintendi last night, giving the club a speedy outfielder who is having a breakout season as a sophomore, hitting .380 with 19 homers and 23 stolen bases while leading the Razorbacks to a College World Series berth.

Sox general manager Ben Cherington said: "It was obvious who we were taking and we were excited to take him."

Benintendi is considered to be an above-average center fielder with tremendous pull-side power as a left-handed hitter.

"Probably more than anything, he does everything really well," said Arkansas coach Dave Van Horn. "He has a lot of tools. He just looks like a baseball player."

"On the defensive side he's a very good defender, he's got a very good arm, very accurate. He can really run. Offensively, he can bunt, he can bunt for a hit, he can hit the ball for a long way. He has a lot of pull power. He does have two or three home runs to left field, but about 15-16 homers he's pulled the ball and hit some of them a long way. And he can steal bases. He has a feel for stealing bases."

"I've had some really good players over the years that have done a few things good, but Andrew does a lot of things good. I think he's going to move quickly through the minor leagues."

Benintendi spent his three days leading up to the draft playing in front of 12,000 fans a night at Baum Stadium in Arkansas, leading the Hogs over Missouri State in the Super Regionals as they advanced to the College World Series.

It's not the same atmosphere as playing in front of 35,000 at Fenway Park, but Benintendi is looking forward to getting his chance.

"Obviously it's a great organization and they have great history," Benintendi said. "Growing up I was a big Red Sox fan and I looked up to Dustin Pedroia, not the biggest guy but the way he competes and the way he works was motivation for me. . . . I'm extremely excited."

The only knock on Benintendi was a vanilla freshman year in which he hit just .276 with one home run and 17 stolen bases. But Van Horn said Benintendi suffered hamstring and wrist injuries early in the year and actually played his best baseball by season's end, when the Razorbacks began playing the tough part of their SEC schedule.

“His freshman year, it was the first time in his life he failed a little bit,” Van Horn said. “So it just had to do with injuries, the grind, just growing up, the competition and travel and all that. But this year he was a lot different player. Just grew up, learned the system, learned the grind and handled it extremely well. He’s had his moments where he’s frustrated but not a big deal, not to the point where we’ve had to say, ‘Hey, stop.’ I’ve seen him really grow up and just mature as a person and a baseball player.”

Being a freshman in college inspires learning, and Benintendi said he learned how to put on muscle and eat healthier heading into his sophomore season.

“I put on 15 pounds this past summer (to get to 180) and coming back from the fall, playing fall ball I started to notice especially with the new baseballs in college, the lower seams this year, that with me putting on some muscle, it played a big factor,” he said.

Can the Red Sox sign him? As a sophomore, Benintendi will have leverage. The Red Sox hope it won’t be a problem.

“I told him it was an incredible opportunity to play in the College World Series, not a lot of guys get to do that,” Cherington said. “I told him we were rooting for him . . . Whenever that’s over we look forward to getting an opportunity to talk to him and hopefully getting him in a Red Sox uniform.”
